### BRIEF NEWS OF OREGON

The potato crop in Polk county is heavy this year.

Steps are being taken to organize a military company in Forest Grove. There are 2400 more head of cattle in Clackamas county this year than last year.

Drain citizens have organized a volunteer fire department, consisting of two hose companies.

J. J. Judd, aged 60, fell from a dock at St. Helens and sustained a broken neck. He died instantly.

The Oregon Baptist State Convention is in session at Eugene for five days, beginning Monday.

Ex-Governor Oswald West denies that he will become a candidate for congress at the next election.

Hundreds of people from all parts of the valley were present at the Central Willamette valley exposition at Albany.

University of Oregon students will have a regular band and a regular band leader if present plans are carried out by the music department.

Governor Withycombe has announced the appointment of Walter K. Taylor of Corvallis as a member of the livestock sanitary board.

The Portland contracting firm of Weaver & Anderson has obtained the contract for the erection of the proposed Masonic lodge building at Heppner.

Two carloads of Jersey island cows, the best in Polk county since the new breed was adopted, were shipped to San Francisco, where exhibits will be made.

Storage room for grain in Baker warehouses is at a premium and still grain is pouring in to be held for an advance in price, according to local mill men.

Four hundred tons of loganberries were pressed into juice in the Willamette valley the season just closed, according to estimates of juice manufacturers of that section.

According to P. L. Harrington, industrial field worker for the state department of education, the school fair held recently at Albany was the best ever held in Linn county.

David Grandison Fairchild, of the United States department of agriculture office of plant introduction, has concluded an inspection of the work of the Oregon agricultural college.

Oregon City has no more use for its filtering plant. The south fork pipe line, built by that city and West Linn at a cost of nearly \$375,000, is now supplying pure mountain water.

Cos and Wasco counties are the only ones that are contemplating raising money through the issue of bonds for the improvement of highways at this time, so far as Deputy State Engineer Cantline knows.

Scroggin & Washburn are preparing to rebuild the electric light and power plant at Lebanon destroyed by fire at the time the big saw mill burned. The plant was almost ready for operation at that time.

All dogs in Gilliam county were ordered quarantined by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, following the receipt of word from the county veterinarian that rabies was prevalent in certain sections of the county.

A milk bulletin which will show the economic features of milk and milk by-products throughout the world will be issued soon by the state university. Comparative costs between Oregon and other great milk-producing regions are to be shown.

For the week ending October 15 there were 141 accidents reported to the industrial accident commission. Of this number, two were fatal. They were Charles Crume of Vincent, killed in sawmill operations, and Victor Bloomquist of Svenson, killed in logging operations.

A family reunion of unusual proportions was held at Foster when the descendants of Stewart and Lizzie Lewis, a pioneer couple who came across the plains to the Oregon country in 1846, met to honor the memory of the pioneer couple. There are over 150 living descendants of the couple.

Two patients in California insane hospitals, whose residences are in Oregon, will be returned to Oregon despite Oregon's refusal to accept the responsibility. When a special train carrying 16 patients who belong in other states goes through, the two Oregon charges will be let off at their home towns.

Development of the kelp beds off the Oregon coast on a large scale for the purpose of obtaining potash is proposed by R. G. Gratigny, representing New York capitalists, in a letter to Secretary of State Olcott. Mr. Gratigny inquires if it would be possible for the state to contract with a corporation on a basis that would permit a large investment.

Saluted wolf hunters have been established in the Umpqua national forest and the Cascade national forest. This announcement was made by E. F. Averill, who is employed by the government to direct a campaign for the extermination of beasts of prey in Oregon and Washington. He says the wolves are causing much damage to stockmen in southern Oregon.

### BATTLE RAGING AT DVINSK

Petrograd Says Germans Attacking Impetuously with Artillery.

Petrograd, via London.—With the exception of Dvinsk, on the northern end of the Russian battle front, where fierce artillery battles continue, the Germans appear to be on the defensive along the entire eastern front.

Russian military officials say they have obtained information that the German armies have been ordered to take Dvinsk at any cost. German attacks at this point have been made with the utmost impetuosity under cover of a terrific artillery fire, but so far they have been unable to break down the Russian defense.

Berlin, via London.—The German war office report on the fighting in the east says:

"In the army group of Field Marshal von Hindenburg, a Russian attack west of Dvinsk failed. Northeast of Wessolowo two attacks were suppressed at the outset by our artillery fire."

### Gaffney's Successor Appointed.

Washington.—William H. Gale, of Virginia, was appointed consul-general at Munich, succeeding T. St. John Gaffney, whose resignation was requested because of unneutral utterances. Mr. Gale formerly was consul at Colon, Panama, but had been transferred recently to Christiania.
