

Department of Agriculture, and County Arigculturist Lovett have been organizing many communities in Crook County for organized work in the poisoning of the jack rabbits. This work of organizing will continue for the next two weeks and, as soon as the weather conditions are favorable, it is hoped that the whole of the county will be covered with the poison and effective destruction of the pest be accomplished during the favorable winter months.
