HOW TO GET MORE EGGS

In winter a regular system of feeding should be adopted and steadily adhered to throughout. Give your hens a comfortable shelter with plenty of light; keep dry, clean and well ventilated, but avoid draughts of cold air. Feed regularly a variety of good clean food. Nimrod Price Passes

Pioneer of Oregon

Nimrod Price, father of R. S. and T. B. Price of this city, died at the family home in Albany last week at the age of 94 years.

Born in Danville, Illinois, Mr. Price came to Oregon in 1852 and lived on his homestead near Albany for more than 60 years.

Mr. Price built the first plastered house in Linn county, one that has been a landmark for many years. He joined the Masonic lodge 68 years ago, and has been one of the leading men of the state almost since its organization.

Besides the two sons mentioned above, Mr. Price leaves two other sons, W. K. Price and Clark Price of Albany, and three daughters, Mrs. Chas. E. Wolverton of Portland, Mrs. H. A. Powell and Mrs. C. F. LaFollette of Highlands, California.
