POLITICAL ANNOUNCEMENTS.

This is open season for candidates. The newspapers of Central Oregon have considered the matter, and agreed to suffer these announcements to be run at nominal rates this year.

The following editorial taken from the columns of the Metolius Record applies to the rates of the Journal. It will be noticed that the length of time the announcement cards are run will make no difference in the cost. The candidate who gets in early and pays his money, gets it off his mind earlier, and incidentally gets more for his money.

The editorial referred to follows: Now is the accepted time for candidates for the various nominations for county offices at the primaries to come out of the woods and declare themselves. The Record will be glad to publish all announcements of candidates at any time between now and the primaries, such announcements being charged for on a basis of \$10.00 cash payment when announcement is inserted, space to be not to exceed two inches. Platforms and other political advertising will be charged for at five cents per line. A \$5.00 additional charge will be made where a cut is run in addition to the announcement. Rate quoted for announcements and cuts will cover date of insertion to the time of the primaries in May.

A GOOD RECORD.

The first year of the present administration of Governor Withycombe has passed, and so quietly that few, excepting some of the newspaper men of the state seem to note the fact.

JUDGE DUFFY.

His record during the time that he has been in office has been even better than could reasonably be expected of a new man in the position. He has proven himself an able man, and has gained a reputation of being a hard worker, making his de-

cisions after considering every phase possible.

He is asking at this time, the support of his party which he will of course receive at the primaries. Later, he will expect and receive the support of friends from all the parties.

OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Important Occurrences of Past Week Briefly Compiled for Our Readers.

The Dalles will have a municipal open air ice skating rink.

Multnomah county spent \$1,668, 799.77 in 1915 for good roads.

Deer, driven in by the snow, were seen in the city limits of Roseburg.

Twenty cattle have died from the effects of rabies at Bly, in Klamath county.

The deep snow is seriously interfering with logging in the Sumpter valley district.

Two dozen farmers sold 130,000 bushels of wheat for \$1 a bushel at La Grande.

The Port of Astoria is to erect coal bunkers and conveyors at Astoria, to cost \$50,000.

What is said to be the first shipment of Oregon hops to South Africa has left Independence.

The Eugene school board has authorized the construction of a new public school building.

During the past year, 47 miles of new graded and gravelled roads were constructed in Linn county.

H. H. Owens of Oakland has been appointed stock inspector for Douglas county by Governor Withycombe.

Registrations for the first two weeks of January in Oregon, as reported to Secretary of State Olcott totaled 9369.

John Rudolph lost both his hands by a premature explosion while working on an irrigating ditch at Gateway.

The thirteenth annual session of the Oregon State Federation of Labor convened in Portland Tuesday, January 25.

D. M. McFadden was arrested at Vale charged with the murder of Clare O'Neil at Riverside, Malheur county.

Roseburg and Douglas county will ship more than 100 cars of broccoli to the eastern markets during the present year.

Twenty-five shipments of whiskey and one of beer have been made into Linn county since the prohibition law took effect.

The date for the meeting of county assessors at the capitol has been fixed by the state tax commission for February 15, 16 and 17.

The 10th annual convention of the Oregon Retail Hardware and Implement Dealers' association convened in Portland January 25.

The Grants Pass city council has made a cut in the salaries paid the municipal officials, effecting a heavy reduction in the payroll.

R. B. Thompson of the Oregon agricultural college has been elected a member of the faculty of the New Mexico agricultural college.

The practically new school at Rickreall has been destroyed by fire, caused by a defective flue. The loss, including furnishings, totals \$8000.

According to the annual report of County Clerk Lenox, fishing and hunting licenses aggregating \$4387 were issued at Roseburg during the year.

Officers of the Roseburg commercial club have begun negotiations for supplying an eastern firm with dried flower petals in lots to exceed 10 tons.

Plans have been made for a \$40,000 building to be erected before fall at the University of Oregon for the schools of education, law and architecture.

A party of Southern Pacific engineers under the direction of O. L. Zentner is at work surveying the proposed route for a spur from Cushman to Florence.

Only one pupil, George D. Zunderlein, of district No. 104, near Woodburn, received a diploma as a result of the recent eighth grade examination in Marion county.

N. H. Bogue, chief engineer for Robert E. Strahorn, with a party of 13 men, has begun work on the survey for the Oregon, California & Eastern railroad east of Bend.

A. R. Chase, a graduate of Oregon agricultural college in the class of 1913, has been appointed by the board of regents to the position of county agriculturist of Wasco county.

At a recent meeting of the independent colleges of the state at McMinnville, a resolution was adopted advising against any of the schools maintaining intercollegiate athletics.

The office of county recorder in Linn county will be abolished if Linn representatives approve a bill to be introduced in the next legislature by Senator E. D. Custack of Albany.

According to the weekly report of the state industrial accident commission there were 149 accidents reported to it during the week ending January 20, but none of them proved fatal.

Secretary of State Olcott has just completed the apportionment to the counties of the money received from motor vehicle and chauffeur licenses for 1915. The total receipts amounted to \$108,881.50. Of this amount \$87,230.08, or 80.1-10 per cent of the total receipts, was returned to the counties.
