Now you state that the county had paid out something over Forty thousand dollars and that the rabbits were not all dead yet. This is true, but a sufficient number of them are dead from the effects of the law, that we have heard no complaint of them having caten up all the crops. Up to 1915, or befor, the rabbits were bunted, it steader remark that rabbits destroyed all my garden, my alfalfa and eighty acres of grain, etc. Last vear not a single complaint was heard. The best gardens, the heaviest yield of grain and alfalfa was raised last year that Harney Valley ever produced before. Mr. Weittenhiller alone raised one fifth as much grain last year as the whole of Harney Valley produced the year before. Think what this amounts to for Harney Valley's future.

## **HOW TO GET MORE EGGS**

In winter a regular system of feeding should be adopted and steadily adhered to throughout. Give your hens a comfortable shelter with plenty of light; keep dry, clean and well ventilated, but avoid draughts of cold air. Feed regularly a variety of good clean food.
