Packing Company Buys Harney Land

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future railroad development.

It is proposed to extend irrigation canals now on the property and to drain the swampy and marshy lands, using the same canals where possible for both irrigation and drainage purposes.

With the big ranches subdivided into small tracks, it is believed Harney county faces a new agricultural future.

The property acquired by the Eastern Oregon Cattle company lies about 60 miles south of Burns. It extends 60 miles west from Maheur lake, its width from three-quarters of a mile to five and six miles.

The proposed Strahorn railroad to central Oregon will traverse parts of the property and with the extensions of the line now under construction westward from Vale, the lands will be served from the east. This road has now reached Riverside.

In the deal recently concluded, W. H. Craven represented the Swifts.

The present state of development of the properties is due to the untiring efforts of William Hanley and Henry L. Corbett. Tom Allen, ex-sheriff of Harney county, has had immediate charge of the land for them.

Including stock on the several ranches the 140,000 acres in the big tract are estimated to be worth close to \$3,000,000.

To Hugh Colburn McPherson, the above named defendant:




