## NEWS FROM THE SCHOOLS

C. C. H. S. NOTES.

M. E. Brink, through the medium of Mrs. Walker, was prevailed upon to address the assembled students Friday morning on the subject of "Civics and the Federal Judiciary." The judge, after a few introductory remarks, struck at once to the heart of his subject and clearly expressed his views, the gist of which is here transcribed. "Civics is the science of good government, hence, it behooves every citizen to familiarize himself with its structure. The men who enacted the constitution were schooled in this science and they applied their minds to the welfare of our nation with unselfish and far sighted ideals. The monument of American liberty erected by these thirty-nine men could not be duplicated by the same number of men today." Mr. Brink outlined the origin and value of the judiciary, its famous men, and touched on the fact that the higher courts do not command the respect in the matter of decisions as of times past. Many unconstitutional laws are due to lack of the primary ethics of Civics, so it apparently is the duty of every boy and girl to prepare for citizenship.

Several petitions have been circulated among the students and townspeople in regard to the single session high school on which are stated the advantages, to-wit: A school operated through one continuous period enables those working for their education to apply more time for that purpose; classes in the morning does away with the unsatisfactory periods of study in the warm afternoons; the fact that many notable schools have adopted the single session speaks strongly for its feasibility. In some instances this may be a detriment to the girls, for there are those whose services are required at home during the noon hour, but the points in favor weigh heavily enough to warrant a trial.

One of the greatest drawing cards of the C. C. H. S. is the Domestic Science department and of all the girls in the classes, each is quick to assert that they have gained a fund of valuable knowledge and experience from their work. The department is managed in a most economic manner and is becoming more and more self-supporting.

The warm weather of the past week has brought out the baseball mits, a few cases of "Spring fever," and a lecture by Superintendent Baughman on discipline.
