FIRST ARREST MADE UNDER THE DRY LAW

Victim Is a Darkey Who Is Held Under Bonds.

BOUGHT ALCOHOL OF DRUGGIST

Made too Many Affidavits and Is Held on Charge of Perjury.

The first arrest to be made under the Oregon prohibition act in Crook County was made at Bend Friday and in this instance was perjury for making a false affidavit to secure alcohol from a druggist and was not for open bootlegging. District Attorney Wirtz went to Bend Friday, gathered the evidence and filed the complaint, personally looking after the matter until the offender was bound over to the grand jury.

The defendant was Ollie Meyer, a "colored gentleman" but until his arrest was made, his color was not known to the officers. It is probably the first case in the State charging perjury in connection with the affidavits required by the act when alcohol is purchased from a iruggist or when liquor is delivered by the agents of common carriers.
