MONTHLY MEETING IRRIGATION BOARD

The selection of an engineer for the Ochoco Irrigation District was postponed until March 21, for the purpose of examining the merits of different applicants. There are nine applicants for the place and the board realize that it is important to get the right man for the job.

Rooms 14 and 15 of the Adamson building were rented and will be the offices of the company.

The bond of treasurer Adamson, in the sum of \$15,000 was approved by the board, and measuring stations on Marks Creek and Mill Creek were ordered established. The next meeting will be held at 1:30, March 21.

BOUNTY MEASURE IS BEING PREPARED

The Newsom Creek Rabbit Club, which has for its purpose the extermination of rabbits in that community, held a meeting at Post Saturday evening which was attended by practically everyone in that community. These people are convinced that the extermination of these pests is necessary for the welfare of the county, and have petitioned the Journal to take

charge of the matter of securing the bounty which has been under discussion for some time.

Petitions are now being printed for circulation, to secure the measure a place on the ballot, and these will be forwarded to the different precincts as soon as they are out.

The measure will provide for a bounty of five cents on jack rabbits and two and a half cents on sage rats.
