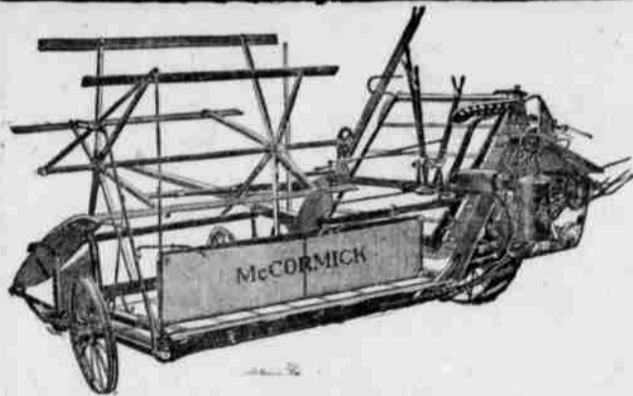

The boys of the C. C. H. S. are to have military training. The school board after making this decision by unanimous vote, attended the high school assembly where strong talks were made regarding the plans for and the benefits of this type of training.

Messrs Brink and Upton were also present and addressed the student body on facts which each have had occasion to study. The arms and uniforms will be furnished by the federal government while members of the faculty will oversee the training. An army officer may be had for inspection from time to time.

It is not the object of the board to encourage a military spirit, but is a plan to enforce a rigid training for which the boys will receive credits. The scheme is excellent in its motive and was heartily endorsed by the students.

Supt. Baughman has accepted an invitation to give the graduating address June 6, to the 1916 class of Springfield, Oregon, where he resided before coming to Prineville.
