ANYTHING ELSE BUT—

We reprint herewith from a communication in our Monday's mail which is a fair sample of scores of letters that fall onto the desk in the country newspaper office during a campaign like the present one.

"With the persistence of a deep and settled conviction that the proposed so-called Beer Amendment is helpful and best for True Temperance, our general committee is sending and offering the enclosed literature bearing on the great question.

Hoping that you will be able to use the same in your publication, and with also an added emphasis on the fact that it is True Temperance that our committee stands for, I remain".

There seems to be nothing offensive in the communication itself, but the fact that it is one of a chain of about the same kind of letters, some offering to buy space, others attempting to overwhelm with a long list of names of people of more or less prominence, but always enclosing literature to convince anyone that the saloon is right, prohibition all wrong, and that the breweries and their numerous agencies should reopen.

All of these things of course this committee has a perfect right to do, although it does not get them

anywhere with the large percentage of the press.

When the committee insists that it stands for "True Temperance" as in the above communication, the answer is that the statement is as far from the truth as is possible.

WILSON'S STRIKE POLICY.

The manner in which the great railroad strike, which would have precipitated an industrial war in America, was averted by President Wilson is being freely criticized by the press, especially those who are the strongest opponents of the President.

While there may be some things about the law that was so hastily passed that are objectionable, the people as a class are going to resent the spirit in which this criticism is offered, and instead of making votes for Mr. Hughes, the opposite will be the result.

The facts are that trouble was avoided, and a press that will not stand by the President regardless of his political party in a time of real crisis is not to be trusted.

EASY MONEY.

The Journal has a letter from the "Equal Rights to Oregon Industry" Committee, which self-styled committee has for its purpose the establishment of the liquor business in Oregon once more.

This communication carefully hints that some advertising space for which they are willing to make payment, could be used in the interests of their cause and asks for details and other information.

The newspapers of the state have had their mails flooded with literature from this source for the past several weeks and practically without exception these communications have gone where they belonged, in the wastebasket.

A time was when the papers eagerly contracted all the space they could with the liquor interests but today besides being a law against liquor advertising, most of

the papers would refuse it on general principles.

The matter in the interests of a campaign of this nature is considered by the press to be at least in sympathy with that business and it will receive practically no consideration.

As a result, the offer of easy money will be ignored by every really legitimate paper in the state.
