

### RABID ANIMALS ATTACK IN DIFFERENT PLACES

Three Persons Bitten Taking  
Pasteur Treatment

HOUSE CAT BITES GIRL AT POST

Young Woman Infected by Dog  
on Streets of Bend--Dog  
Promptly Killed

The five-year-old daughter of E. E. Gillenwater, of Post, was attacked by the house cat with which she had been accustomed to play at the family home recently and was either bitten or scratched twice on the face.

The following day the cat attacked Mr. Gillenwater and later tried to bite a cow that passed by the house.

It was killed at once and the head sent to Portland, where an examination soon disclosed that it was a well developed case of rabies.

The little girl was brought to this city at once and is being given the pasteur treatment by Dr. Bolknep regularly.

Considerable excitement was caused in this part of the county the last of the week when some of the stock which were infected at the same time that F. D. Scammon and Harry Swagert were bitten by a dog near Fife, developed strange symptoms and some of them died.

Mr. Scammon left at once for Portland and reached that city safely. Pasteur treatments were started at once, and the latest word we have from the office of Dr. David N. Roberg, state health officer, is to the effect that no symptoms have developed and that Mr. Scammon is getting along nicely.

The head of a cow which died on the day Mr. Scammon left home was sent to the office of Dr. Roberg and he reports that no negri bodies were found in the examination.

The city council of Bend has ordered all dogs to be muzzled within the city. This would be a wise precaution for other towns to take also.
