approximately the sum of \$409,000 and they shall take the bonds of the district at par for said construction. putting up a satisfactory surety bond in the full amount of the contract price to guarantee the completion of the work according to speciscation. The bond shall be filed upon delivery to them of the bonds and work shall begin within 15 days thereafter and shall be completed by March 1st, 1919. The canal will be built during the fall of 1917 so that the flood water from the Ochoco can be used for irrigation during 1918,

The contract does not become effective however unless the district is able to dispose of the balance of its bonds consisting of about \$500,000. The district reserves the right to reject any and all bids made for its bonds and if they do reject the bids or if they fall to find a purchaser then the contract becomes null and void.

The interests of this district are thus fully protected, for the district impossible to get one firm to buy first has to approve the contractor the full amount of the bond issue

ceives one, so that if conditions war lasts. change between now and the time the bonds are offered for sale, it can take such action as the occasion warrants and thus declare the contract null and void.

Mr. Ralph Sneelock, representing the firm of Clark Kendall & Co., expressed himself as being very confident of his ability both to find a good responsible contractor who would take over the work of construction and to secure the cooperation of four or five other bond houses who would subscribe for the bond issue. Under his plan he proposes to give the contractor one-half the construction price in cash and the balance in bonds and this would make it necessary to sell about \$700,000.00 of the bonds and he believes that he can within the next thirty days get five or possibly six bond houses to go in together and finance the bond fissue.
