G. M. Alexander was in the city yesterday evening on duties in connection with his work as official tester for the Cow Testing Association of Crook and Deschutes counties.

The object of the tester is to find just how good each animal is, and to eliminate the "boarders" or the cows that are not paying, and to show the values of different kinds of food stuffs, for the dairy herd.

The association is now testing about 300 cows, and will have a much larger number at the beginning of the new year, which will be in August.
