PORTLAND AND **RUSSIA WILL FIGHT AMERICANS ASSURED**

Promises to Continue in War and Make No Separate Peace.

Hetrograd.-A stirring proclamation placing the council of workmen and soldiers' delegates on record as irrevocably opposed to a separate peace was adopted by the council. ' The proclamation was prompted by Austrian efforts to lure Russia into a sep arate peace.

"The Russian people consider was inevitable and will continue it. The Russians have no imperialistic wishes. We know that you have none. We shall fight together to secure liberty, freedom and happiness for all the world. I am happy to say that I do not see any moral idea or factor be tween America and Russia to divide us. We two peoples-Russia fighting tyranny and America standing as the oldest democracy-hand in hand will show the way of happiness to nations great and small." These ringing words, expressing the

attitude of the Russian government toward America and the American mission, headed by Elihu Root, were volced by M. Tereschtenko, minister of foreign affairs, responding for the council of ministers to Mr. Root's address of sympathy and goodwill on the part of the American government.


