RUSSIA WILL FIGHT AMERICANS ASSURED

Promises to Continue in War and Make No Separate Peace.

Petrograd.—A stirring proclamation placing the council of workmen and soldiers' delegates on record as irrevocably opposed to a separate peace was adopted by the council.

The Russian people consider war inevitable and will continue it. The Russians have no imperialistic wishes. We know that you have none.

These ringing words, expressing the attitude of the Russian government toward America and the American mission, headed by Elihu Root, were voiced by M. Tereschenko, minister of foreign affairs, responding for the council of ministers to Mr. Root's address of sympathy and goodwill on the part of the American government.

BRITAIN SEEKS HER MEN IN AMERICA

New York.—All male British subjects between the ages of 18 and 45 years now in the United States are to be compelled to join the British colors if the laws of this country will permit, it was made known here.

Speaking to a Journal representative yesterday she said: "It is impossible to realize the great call for doctors and nurses throughout the allied countries. Many large districts and towns are without a doctor of any kind, and trained nurses are not found except in the hospitals where the wounded are being cared for."

"The work of the hospitals is so efficient that about 90 per cent of the wounded are saved, and 75 per cent of all the men who are brought in are able to return to the front, some in a few days, some in several months.

"The quantity of supplies that are necessary cannot be imagined. Cotton and wool for padding of wounds has been a serious problem for many months. School children are being used to gather the silk moss from the pete fields, which is made up into pads, shipped by the ton and the ship load to the British and other nations who are in a greater need possibly for these supplies, where these pads are used as a substitute for cotton in wound dressings.

"Even this material is becoming short, and recently the French have been compelled to use a paper substitute for dressing wounds."
