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

SAVE 11,000,000 LOAVES A DAY The above caption is a new war cry that has led the friends of food conservation to victory in the passage of a law on Saturday in the national house of representatives, which besides having a great many regulatory clauses, prohibits the use of food materials in the manufac ture of alcohol.

The nation appears aroused to the folly of extensive campaigns for back yard gardens, prevention of food waste in the kitchens of the nation, and poor handling of food stuffs while the enormous amount of grain and other materials is being wasted in the liquor manufacturing business.

This has not been brought about by the efforts of so-called prohibitionists, but is an action in which the people of the nation are to a great extent united.

The efficiency of its fighting men is also a factor. Our war department is not blind to the fact that the best insurance actuarial authorities state in the cold calculations of science that one hundred and eighty men die among moderate drinkers for each one hundred among abstainers under exactly like exposure and circumstances.

The Connecticut Manufacturers Association, representing over 200 of the leading manufacturers of that state passed a resolution favoring complete War Prohibition by a vote of 176 to 1

The American Medical Association, the most representative body of its kind in the world, at its national convention in New York this month adopted resolutions declaring alcohol to be neither a food nor a stimulant

The National Conference of Char ities and Correction violated its custom of passing no resolution on a contraverted subject, and recognizing the patriotic character and ovrshadowing importance of the question, unanimously adopted a resolution of the same nature.
