

STATE ENGINEER ISSUES PERMITS FOR WATER

State Engineer, John H. Lewis issued 104 permits to appropriate water and 4 permits to construct reservoirs during the second quarter of 1917, covering the irrigation of 5,395 acres of land and the development of 161 horsepower, with an estimated cost of construction of \$86,520.

During this period, permits were issued in Crook, Jefferson and Deschutes counties as follows:

To James Trapman, W. F. Galbraith & Wm. Patterson, of Terrebonne, for the irrigation of 1,047 acres of land from Crooked River, the construction works estimated to cost \$8,000.

To Walter T. Morris, of Post, for the irrigation of 130 acres from Crooked River, construction cost estimated at \$1,200.

To C. L. Gist, of Sisters, for domestic supply from Squaw Creek.

To C. L. Ream, of Post, for the irrigation of 50 acres from Drake Creek and reservoir.

To H. L. Corbett, of Portland, for a supplementary supply for the irrigation of 440 acres from Crooked River.

To A. L. Houghtaling, of Vanora, for domestic supply and irrigation of 66 acres from Deschutes River.

To Perry A. South, of Crescent, for domestic supply and irrigation of 2 acres from Potter Springs.

To Fremont Land Co., of Minneapolis, for domestic and manufacturing from Paulina Creek.

To the Sisters Domestic Water Users Association, of Sisters, for domestic supply from Squaw Creek.
