

RUSSIAN REVOLT IS NEARING COLLAPSE

Kerensky Reported Returning to Petrograd at Head of 200,000 Troops.

London.—The Bolshevik revolution in Petrograd which ousted the Kerensky government last week is reported to be approaching collapse. Regiments loyal to Premier Kerensky are marching on the capital and fighting is under way in the city, according to reports from Petrograd. An organization, which has adopted the name of All-Russian Committee for Saving the Country and the Revolution, announced that the defeat of the Bolshevik movement was a matter of days or hours only.

Most encouraging of the late news was word from Petrograd that the railway, post and telegraph employees—all government servants—had switched their allegiance from the Bolshevik back to the provisional government and refused to obey Bolshevik orders.

A wireless dispatch from Haparanda in Sweden, near the Finnish border, says that Premier Kerensky has 200,000 men supporting him.

The wireless message, which escaped the censorship of the Bolsheviks by being sent from Haparanda, says Premier Kerensky left Petrograd for general headquarters concealed in the bottom of an automobile ambulance. It is understood he was accompanied by General Alexieff, former commander-in-chief, and by Foreign Minister Terestchenko.

TEUTON ADVANCE IS SLOWING DOWN

Italian Headquarters.—Observers from advanced positions along the front say the Austrian advance is not showing the impetuous rush of previous days and evidently is slackening as it gets farther from its base. The largest guns they have brought into play thus far are of a type about the same as our five-inch.

They have been unable to bring forward any of their heavy guns, doubtless because of the condition of the bridges and roads torn up or destroyed by the Italians.

The enemy's operations on the north and east in an attempt at encirclement of the Italians have not succeeded. The menace on the Italian left wing also is virtually passed.

British batteries have taken their position along the front line prepared to give support to the heroic services heretofore chiefly borne by the Italian rearwards in the effort to stay the Austro-German advance.

The reformation of the Italian army along the established position is progressing in good order.

GERMANS LOSE HALF MILE

British Force Their Way Along Paschendaele Ridge.

The British headquarters in Belgium.—The British successfully carried out a small but important operation north and northwest of Paschendaele whereby the salient about Paschendaele and Goeborg was considerably widened, giving the British a firm grip on their recently acquired positions in the northern crest of the ridge.

The advance was over a 2500-yard front and the extreme depth reached was about 800 yards. The attack was carried out with the precision which has marked all the recent British moves in Flanders. It was reported that not only had the objective been reached, but some of the men had even gone beyond them northward along the ridge.

The Germans failed to make a single counterattack to this blow, despite the fact that captured Germans declared Hindenburg had ordered the retaking of Paschendaele at all costs. The enemy lines were pulverized by the tremendous British fire and unable to reform for an attack.

High Hopes for Kerensky Entertained.

Washington.—High hopes that Russia's provisional government may suppress the radicals at Petrograd quickly and emerge stronger than before, were raised at both the state department and the Russian embassy by press dispatches reporting Premier Kerensky safe and returning to the capital at the head of a strong force.

Cabinet All Bolshevik.

Petrograd.—The All-Russian Congress of Workmen and Soldiers' Delegates is reported unofficially to have named a cabinet composed of Bolshevik and then adjourned. The cabinet is headed by Nikolai Lenin as premier and Leon Trotsky as foreign minister.

Washington.—Forty-one members of the National Woman's party were arrested at the two front gates of the white house for picketing.

FLEET CORPORATION IS REORGANIZED

Big Business Men Are Put In Charge of Constructing Vessels.

Washington.—Because the business of building ships for the United States emergency fleet has not produced vessels as rapidly as planned, a practical reorganization of the emergency fleet corporation has taken place.

Big business men have been put in charge. And from now on the entire work will be conducted as only one of America's great corporations would be—by big organizers. The following men have been named to push the work with all haste:

Charles Piez of Chicago, president of the Link Belt company; James Heyworth of Chicago, contractor; A. J. Mason of Chicago, engineer; Charles Day of Philadelphia, contractor; Frank Kirby of New York, architect; John Burton Payne of Chicago, lawyer.

To Mr. Piez will be given the job of turning out America's ships with speed. He becomes really the active head of the emergency fleet corporation, because as vice president he is next to Edward N. Hurley, president of the corporation and chairman of the United States shipping board. The other men will all work in close cooperation with Mr. Piez.

The fleet corporation is now about 30 per cent behind in its supply of lumber, hence delay in the carrying out of its program. There are now 310 wooden ships in process of construction and contracted for. Probably no more will be wanted. There are 220 fabricated ships to be built. The steel program has not been delayed to such an extent because they are longer in the making and their construction did not call for such speed as the wooden and fabricated vessels.

The program calls for 6,000,000 tons of vessels by the end of 1918. It was said that with the proper application the reorganized corporation will be able to meet them and, moreover, keep to the schedule that will provide 10,000,000 tons of shipping by the end of 1919.
