All have enjoyed the sermons and lectures of Dr. Marvin and we are now ready for a better service in our community.

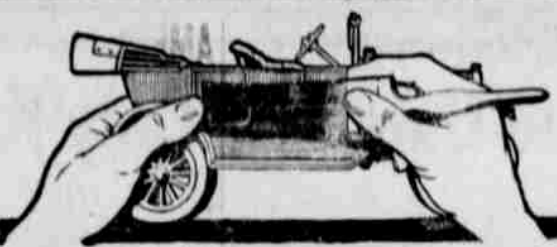
