
March has been a busy month for both the office and field forces. Since March 3rd, 11 livestock association meetings have been held with users of the Ochoco Forest. At every meeting keen interest has been shown, and while in a few cases stockmen have disagreed with ideas advanced by the Forest Service, as a rule the suggestions made and plans proposed have met with little opposition. We are looking forward to pleasant relations with the stockmen in working out range problems which are of vital interest to both the users of the range and the Government. One of the points of major im-

portance is the establishment of a June 1 season for all cattle instead of allowing a percentage of them to go onto the range by April 15 as has been done in years past. The Supervisor's office has authority to permit stock to enter 15 days in advance of the opening date, and it will probably be advisable to exercise the authority given. By a later entrance date, the range will not suffer from trampling by stock when the ground is wet, and the grass only started in many localities. The later season will also enable the Forest Service to care for much more stock than could formerly be permitted. The local office will do its utmost to care for as many head to the events which will take place of stock as the range will stand, and it is believed that the total increase will be more than 2000 head for this Forest
