

## DAVID DUNN AGAIN IN TROUBLE AT BEND

STABS GROVER CALDWELL IN FIGHT WEDNESDAY EVENING

### HORSE WAS CAUSE OF TROUBLE

Both Men Are From the High Desert and Have Been in Court Several Times Before

David Dunn, of Imperial, slashed Grover Caldwell's body in several places when the two engaged in a street fight in Bend Wednesday evening about 8 o'clock.

The trouble is supposed to have started over the disputed ownership of a horse, although each man tells a different story.

Dunn had just arrived from Blacklock and was walking down the street with another man when he met Grover Caldwell and his brother Ralph. After a short conversation concerning a certain horse which Dunn claimed belonged to him, the two men began emphasizing their words with blows. Dunn drew a knife and inflicted several serious wounds.

Caldwell was taken to the hospital and Dunn was placed in the county jail to await trial. He entered a plea of not guilty.

Both men have been in court before and Caldwell is accused of stealing a steer from U. S. Bushnell, of Powell Butte, and will come before the grand jury next month.

The trial of Dunn, charged with attacking Caldwell, took place Saturday afternoon before Judge Eastes.

He was bound over to the grand jury and his bail placed at \$5,000. He is to be held in jail until it is certain that blood poisoning or other serious complications do not arise from the wounds he inflicted on Caldwell.

## GERMANS CLAIM A GREAT VICTORY

Cities of Peronne and Ham Captured and Booty Said to Be Enormous.

Berlin, via London.—The British in their retirement are burning French towns and villages and between the Somme and the Oise the Germans are still going forward.

Enormous quantities of booty have been taken by the Germans, according to the war office statement, which follows:

"Between the Somme and the Oise our corps are fighting their way forward. Chauny has been taken.

"Our booty in war material is enormous.

"We have bombarded the fortress of Paris with long-distance guns.

"A gigantic struggle is taking place for Bapaume. A battle is in progress on the Transloy-Cambles-Maurepas line.

"The Somme has been crossed at many points in our attack between Peronne and Ham."

"The Germans have captured Peronne and Ham and defeated British and American regiments brought from the southwest for a counter-attack on Chauny.

"More than 30,000 prisoners have been captured and 600 guns have been taken by the Germans."

## GERMANS ARE DRIVEN BACK ACROSS SOMME

London.—German forces crossed the Somme river south of Peronne, between the city and Licourt, but were driven back by counter-attacks, Field Marshal Haig reported.

The battle continues with great violence on the whole front. Powerful attempts delivered by the enemy north of Bapaume were heavily repulsed. Only at one point did the German infantry reach the British trenches, whence they were immediately thrown out. Elsewhere the enemy's attacks were stopped by rifle, machine gun and artillery fire in front of the positions and his troops were driven back with great loss.

The lecture by Rev. Van Nuy, Saturday night was very interesting and instructive.



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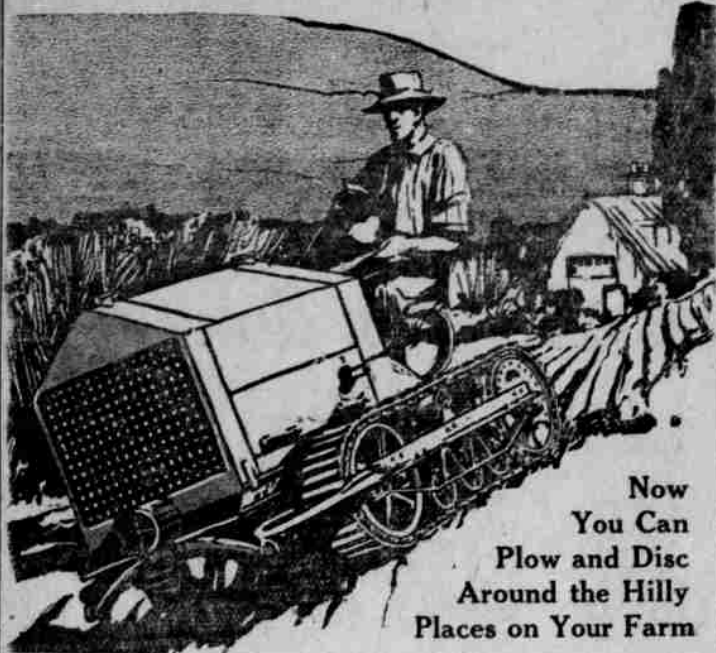
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
