### HALF OF PROJECT READY FOR WATER

SYSTEM BUILT IN ABOUT SIX MONTHS FROM START

### WATER FROM MCKAY NEXT WEEK

Good Progress Is Being Made Throughout Entire Project

Six months ago, or to be exact, on October 11, 1917, the first dirt was moved on the construction of the canal system for the Ochoco Project, and tonight the steam shovel will complete the main canal on the part of the system west of McKay, which practically completes that half of the system.

Water will be placed in the laterals, starting on the east side of that part of the project, just as fast as the drops can be "puddled in" and will be kept there as long as the supply from McKay lasts.

Good progress is reported from the remaining part of the system, especially that part lying east of Barney Butte, which is practically completed.

The lateral system, and the west end of the main canal was built by the district under the direct supervision of Project Engineer Rea and the foreman for the works is P. McD. Fuller, who is also very efficient.

### MANY HONOR FLAGS WON

Secretary of Treasury Urges That Campaign Be Pushed to Utmost.

San Francisco.—Honor flags to cities and counties which have reached their quotas in the third liberty loan are flying from Texas to the Canadian line and from the Pacific ocean to points far inland, liberty loan headquarters announced here.

In the twelfth federal reserve district Madera county won the first county flag and Mosier, Or., the first city flag.

Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo telegraphed liberty loan headquarters to put every effort into the drive. Mr. McAdoo asked for campaigns of education in the schools and the organization of war savings societies to push every campaign for the sale of government securities.

1000 Slackers Arrested in Minneapolis. Minneapolis, Minn.—Approximately 1000 men of military age who did not have their registration cards or other credentials with them, were taken into custody here when agents of the department of justice and members of the local home guards raided 197 pool-rooms and dancehalls in the city.

Illinois Lynching to Be Probed. Collinsville, Ill.—State officials, acting under instructions of the attorney-general, will take over investigation of the lynching of Robert P. Prager, an enemy alien hanged here last week after he had been accused of making disloyal remarks.

### AMERICANS DEFEAT RAID NEAR TOUL

With the American Army in France.—The Germans attempted a raid on the American positions northwest of Toul, after a violent artillery preparation. They were driven off by the American artillery and machine gun fire and suffered comparatively heavy casualties, leaving two prisoners in the hands of the Americans.

An American corporal in a listenik post saw a big German sergeant wearing the iron cross passing close by. He leaped out and hit him with his rifle butt and then throttled him and hauled him into one of the American trenches. Another German was captured in no man's land by another corporal, whose squad covered the German while the corporal advanced and demanded his surrender. The German threw up his hands and yelled "kamerad."

The prisoners talked freely and divulged considerable valuable information. General Pershing arrived at the headquarters at the front as the prisoners were brought in.

#### BRIEF NEWS OF THE WAR

General Foch has succeeded during the past week in definitely halting Von Hindenburg's western drive everywhere, except in the direction of Amiens.

The original momentum of the German advance, which extended over a front of 50 miles, has now been concentrated in the small sector to the east of Amiens.

Hindenburg continues to throw fresh troops into the battle, and it is estimated that approximately 600,000 men were actively engaged in the combats that have been in progress during the past few days. This estimate, of course, does not include the reserves held behind the lines.

The present fighting is progressing over a rather broken country, and the Germans are meeting with the fiercest resistance on every inch of it, and they are open to counter-attacks that are perilous for them. The slight fluctuations in the lines in the last few days show how the French and British are taking advantage of the natural conformation of the ground, while they are strengthening their defensive lines and their artillery.

The anniversary of the entry of the United States into the war was made the occasion of celebrative functions in London, Paris and Rome and the sending of numerous messages of felicitation by allied leaders. A notable utterance was that by Premier Lloyd George, in which he predicted that during "the next few weeks" the United States would give the Prussian military junta the surprise of their lives."

183 Americans Are Killed in Action. Washington.—Army casualties for the first year of America's participation in the war announced by the war department are as follows: Killed in action, 183; lost at sea, 237; died of wounds, 52; died of disease, 793; suicide, unknown causes, 39; wounded, 777; captured, 22; missing, 41.

British and Japs Land at Vladivostok. Washington.—News of the landing of the British force at Vladivostok which followed a Japanese party into the city, reached the state department officially from the American consul there.

New Aides in War Department Named. Washington.—President Wilson appointed Edward R. Stettinius second assistant secretary of war and Fred P. Keppel third assistant secretary of war.
