W. S. S. SPRING DRIVE BEGUN ON RATS AND RABBITS

A vigorous spring offensive against sage rats and jack rabbits is being waged by the farmers of Crook and Deschutes Counties in cooperation with County Agricultural Agent Ward. During the past week, 1900 quarts of sage rat poison have been mixed and strychnine sufficient for 2000 quarts more is being mixed up by various community clubs. The casualty list on one farm near Redmond reports all sage rats on eighty acres have been killed but six.

The Deschutes County Court is preparing to furnish the County Agent with 100 ounces more of strychnine. The success of this plan of community poisoning has resulted in many Crook County farmers requesting their court to do likewise and in the near future it is expected that Crook County will also have a supply of strychnine that will be prepared in the proper manner by the County Agent. The Powell Butte Club met on April 11 with the County Agent for the purpose of mixing up 200 quarts of squirrel poison and commencing the spring drive. S. D. Mustard, of Powell Butte, holds the record for large kills. With a two-pound tomato can full of poison mixed by Mr. Ward last spring, he killed and picked up 98 sage rats. The damage done to range grasses and crops by these pests amounts to many thousands of dollars annually in Crook and Deschutes Counties.
