IMPORTANT NOTICE

To The Public:—

We are in receipt of advice from wholesale houses calling our attention to changes in the terms of credit which will be effective June 1st, 1918.

We are advised that war conditions have so effected the cost and production of merchandise that it is no longer possible for wholesale houses to get the usual credit from manufacturers, therefore they have found it necessary to shorten their terms of credit to the retail merchant to ten, fifteen and thirty days time, owing to the class of merchandise purchased.

The same letter informs us "The Government has requested everyone to eliminate all long time credits and to get down as far as possible to a cash, or not to exceed a 30 day settlement basis."

This radical change in the terms of credit, brought on by conditions over which we have no control and for which we are not responsible, have lessened our ability to carry accounts in the future as we have in the past, therefore we find it necessary to shorten our terms of credit to conform with the terms given us by those from whom we buy our merchandise.

Commencing June 1st, 1918, our terms will be 30 days only on charge accounts. All merchandise accounts contracted for during the month of June will be due and payable July 1st, and all merchandise accounts contracted for each month thereafter will be due and payable on the first of each month following.

Wholesale houses will not deviate from the terms they have specified and demand that we adhere to them strictly. This, in turn, compels us to adopt the same policy, and we assure you that your co-operation in the matter will not only be appreciated by retail dealers, but will also be appreciated by the United States Government.
