

## REGISTRATION OF MEN IS REQUIRED JUNE 5

ALL HAVING REACHED AGE OF 21 YEARS MUST COMPLY

NO EXCUSES WILL BE ACCEPTED

Only Exception Are Soldiers and Sailors Already in Service of the United States

Wednesday, June 5, is registration day for all men in the United States who have attained the age of 21 years since June 5, one year ago. This applies to all citizens and non-citizens.

No man will be exempted from registering unless he is already in the military or naval service of the United States. Men, who for any reason have been discharged from service, must register on June 5.

No excuses will be accepted for not registering. If you are too ill to appear before your local draft board you must send some competent person to explain circumstances and obtain registration card which will be properly filled out. This card must be returned to the local board by your representative.

Unavoidable absence from your home district will not excuse failure to register. If you must be absent, go at once to your local board and explain circumstances and you will be properly instructed.

Keep your registration certificate for your own protection and be ready to show it on demand, otherwise you are liable to arrest as a registration evader.

The registration will be conducted by local boards throughout the United States, and each board is required to post publicly the location of its registration place.

The hours for registration are from 7 o'clock a. m. to 9 o'clock p. m. and the day is Wednesday, June 5.

### ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER ARRESTED TUESDAY

Marion Mayfield was arrested Tuesday evening by Deputy Sheriff Floyd Rowell, on a charge of bootlegging. Mr. Mayfield has been under suspicion for some time and has been closely watched by the authorities.
