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FRANCO-AMERICANS CAPTURE FISMES

Big German Storehouse Taken By Allies After a Bitter Struggle.

Paris. - The town of Fismes, Ger many's great storehouse on the Alsne-Marne battle front, has been taken by the French and American troops, according to the French official communication.

The Americans covered themselves with glory in the hand-to-hand fighting in the streets of Fismes when they captured that German base. The fighting is said to have been the bitterest of the whole war, the Prussian guards asking no quarter and being bayonetted or clubbed to death as they stood by their machine guns.

Fismes was taken after a heavy ar tillery fight. When the Americans de cided to advance it was after careful preparation and under a sweeping bar rage of shrappel and gas, the infantry advanced. There was opposition from machine guns, but the Americans quickly silenced them.

The number of prisoners captured by the allies during Saturday and Sunday will thrill the allied world when announced.

The Vesle river, which was flooded owing to the recent heavy rains, hampered the German rear-guards which were unable to ford the stream. Most of those Germans were killed and the rest were made prisoners.

Allied forces in pursuit of the Germans passed through veritable charnel

300,000 AMERICANS **CROSS DURING JULY**

Washington.-Major General Hunter Liggett, commanding the first American army corps, is in active charge of that corps on the center of the allied drive in the Aisne-Marne salient, General March, chief of staff, told newspaper correspondents at the semi-weekly conference at the war de

The American divisions forming this corps are serving contiguously on this sector, the control of which is in the hands of Major General Liggett, as commander of the first major American unit to get into action in

General Pershing, as a result of recent transfers of American divisions which had been brigaded with the British, now has 1,000,000 men under his direct command, the chief of staff stated

The number of American divisions actively engaged on this sector has been increased to eight, now including the 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th regulars and the 26th, 28th, 32d and 42d national guard. General March announced that it was the 42d division which met and defeated the Prussian guards during the present week.

Total embarkation of American troops during July broke all records, it was announced officially, more than 300,000 men having been shipped. The grand total embarked to the

end of July has passed the 1,300,000 mark. The previous high monthly record was for June when 276,000 men were sent overseas.

U. S. WAR LOSS OVER 15,000

Sunday Casualty List is Longest Yet Received.

Washington. - Army and marine corps casualties reported from overseas during the week ending Sunday increased 1430, compared with 1050 the week before. Total casualties reported are 15,196, including Sunday's army list of 283—the largest number yet reported in a single day-and marine corps list of two.

While as yet no figures on casualties in the great allied offensive in which American troops are playing such a conspicuous part, the increase in the daily army lists undoubtedly is due in part to this fighting. The increase for the week was 1384. The marine corps list increased only 46 for the seven days.

Wilson Urges Suffrage.

Washington,-Enactment of the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment to the federal constitution is characterized as a "great and now critical reform" in a letter written by President Wilson to David Baird, the new senator from New Jersey, asking the senator to vote for the amendment.
