The rapid advance of machinery for farming, which will farther increase the amount of food produced per capita, is to the farming industry what other industrial inventions have been in their particular lines.

In keeping with these progresses comes the tractor show at Portland this week, where many machines will be on display, and the farmer can select just the type of tractor that is best suited for his conditions, the size of his farm and his purse.

The man who says a tractor cannot be successfully used on a farm only demonstrates that he is not in touch with the progress of the times, for they are in use successfully in all the larger farming districts of the continent today, and the next ten years will prove that the farm without a tractor will be as much a novelty as the man who per-
