Katherine Drury Heads The List

Mr. Evans has just compiled the scholarship of the entire student body of the high school for the first six weeks' period ending October 18. He has also determined the scholarship by classes, and the average scholarship of the school for this period.

The Seniors lead all classes in the group scholarship, making a percentage of 88.7. The Juniors follow with 86.5 per cent, the Sophomores with 85.9 per cent, Freshmen with 84.2 per cent. This seems consistent with things that the Sophomores should excel the Freshmen and so on through the four classes, but when we come to the ten highest ranking students in school we do not find this consistency obtaining, for here we find that Katherine Drury leading in this list, Katherine Drury leading not only her class but the entire school with a percentage of 95.5.

The Freshmen have 3 in this list, the Seniors 2, and the Juniors but one. Following are the ten students who have highest averages and rank of each:
