YANKS ENTER LUXEMBURG

Americans Are Received With Expressions of Joy By People.

Luxemburg.—General Pershing entered the city of Luxemburg ahead of his troops. The American commander and his staff drove into the capital in automobiles. The general was greeted by thousands of cheering Luxemburgers and with the blowing of sirens and the ringing of church and school bells. The Eighteenth Infantry of the First division wore the first American troops to enter the city.

The Americans were greeted by thousands of civilians, who lined the streets through which the troops marched. School children tossed flowers in their pathway and each soldier was presented with a bouquet of chrysanthemums.

LAND ELIMINATED FROM DESCHUTES FOREST

On November 27 the President signed a proclamation eliminating approximately 46,062 acres from the Deschutes National Forest, Oregon. The main area affected comprises a tract about 7 miles square, situated near the present southwestern corner of the forest. This tract is practically a solid body of privately owned land having become alienated as a result of consolidation of Forest lands through the means of land exchange between the Government and certain land owners. Of all the lands excluded nearly 90 per cent. of the total area is privately owned, only about 4,500 acres of Government lands being affected. These areas were shown to have little value for National Forest purposes, while at the same time containing agricultural possibilities.

The President's proclamation results from recommendations submitted by the Secretary of Agriculture.

SURVEY IS STARTED

R. H. Baldock Is Here For Purpose Of Locating First Twenty-Eight Miles of Crooked River Road

R. H. Baldock is in Prineville securing data concerning the Crooked River road. While here he will locate the first twenty-eight miles and the survey will probably be extended on through the remaining distance. He is here for the purpose of determining how many men will be needed and other important details. The information he secures will be brought before the State Highway Commission at its January meeting.

Nation Asked to Voice Gratitude.

Washington.—President Wilson, in a proclamation, has designated Thursday, November 28, as Thanksgiving day and said this year the American people have special and moving cause to be grateful and rejoice. Complete victory, he said, has brought not only peace, but the confident promise of a new day as well, in which "justice shall replace force and jealous in-trigue among the nations."
