## FOCH SAYS FRANCE MUST HOLD RHINE

Barrier Between Countries Declared Necessary to Prevent Comeback.

Treves.—It is the conviction of Marshal Foch that the Rhine must be made the barrier between Germany and France. He expressed this clearly when he received American newspaper correspondents. The marshal is here in connection with the meeting concerning the extension of the German armistice.

Marshal Foch pointed out the difficulties that had been overcome and said that peace must be commensurate with the price of victory. Germany now was beaten, he added, but with her resources, especially in men, recuperation in a comparatively short time was quite possible. It was now the duty of the allies to prevent further aggressions.

Marshal Foch praised the work of the American troops and said that General Pershing had asked that the American forces be concentrated for an attack on one sector. The allied generalissimo admitted that the Argonne-Meuse front, where the Americans began their offensive on September 26, was a "sector hard to tackle." The marshal said he had told General Pershing:

"Your men have the devil's own punch. They will get away with all that. Go to it."

The allies, the marshal said, were prepared for another offensive stroke, which would have forced the Germans to give up. This was to have been made in Lorraine on November 14, with six American and 20 French divisions.

## GERMAN STEAMERS MAY BRING YANKS

Paris.—All the more important German passenger steamers, including the huge Imperator, may be used to transport American troops homeward, under the extension of the armistice signed at Treves. The German mercantile fleet is placed at the disposal of the associated governments. Only smaller steamships are left to the Germans and are for Baltic coastal trade.

Remuneration to be paid to Germany will be applied on payments for foodstuffs furnished to Germany under another part of the agreement. These supplies include 70,000 tons of pork and 200,000 tons of cereals. For part of this latter item condensed milk may be substituted.

The shipping arrangement was elaborated at meetings apart from the regular armistice commission and were the first civilian deliberations between Germans and representatives of the associated governments.

Edward N. Hurley, head of the American shipping board, presided. Philip Helneken, of the North German Lloyd company, was leader of the German delegation to ten.

## POLES APPROVE MINISTRY

Socialist Minority Alone is Said to Be Against Paderewski.

Warsaw.—The Polish ministry formed by Ignace Jan Paderewski apparently meets the approval of all parties except radical Socialists.

The new cabinet represents most of the parties in German, Russian and Austrian Poland. Bankers of Posen have loaned it 100,000,000 marks.

M. English, a banker of Posen, assumed office as minister of finance. M. Paderewski will take charge of the foreign office with the assistance of five under secretaries.

## Rancher Murders Wife and Kills Self.

Hillsboro, Or.—Leaving a note declaring that he had killed three men in his time, but that it "took nerve" to kill the woman that he loved and worshipped, Charles W. Colby, 67, a rancher of near Beaverton, shot and killed his wife and then turned the weapon upon himself, early Saturday morning.

The bodies were found by Sheriff Alexander shortly after midnight Saturday, when he went to the farm in response to the note mailed to him by Colby.

## Germans Arm to Beat Back Poles.

Berlin.—The German government is reported organizing two armies to counteract an invasion by the Poles, threatening Brandenburg. Forces in West Prussia will be under General von Quast and in Silesia under Field Marshal Woeyrsch.

## Des Moines Troops Riot.

Des Moines, Iowa.—A captain and a first lieutenant are under arrest and three overseas soldiers were tried by summary court martial as the result of a riot which occurred when a city traffic officer arrested a soldier for disorderly conduct.
