NO SEALS SOLD THIS YEAR.
The customary sale of Red Cross
Christmas seals will not be held this
year. It seemed best to both the
American Red Cross and the National
Tuberculosis Association to unite in
the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call to
reduce the number of appeals to the
public for contributions. There will
be no lessening of activities by the
National Tuberculosis Association
through this arrangement, as the Red
Cross War Council has appropriated
\$2,500,000 for anti-tuberculosis work
in 1919 in lieu of the money that ordi-
narily would be raised by a Christmas
Seal Campaign. However, every per-
son joining the Red Cross during the
Red Cross Christmas Roll Call will be
awarded ten seals to be used as here-
tofore.
