

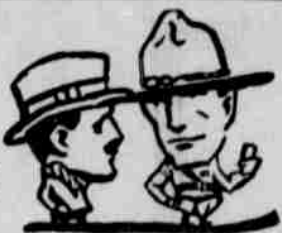

Washington.—After a week of spir-
ited debate the senate by a vote of
53 to 18, passed the bill appropriating
\$100,000,000 for food relief in Europe
and the Near East. The fund was re-
quested by President Wilson as a
means of checking the westward
spread of Bolshevism.

The measure now goes to confer-
ence for adjustment of minor senate
amendments. The most important
senate amendment changes the house
section against feeding enemy peoples
so that nationalities friendly to the
United States and the allies may be
aided. On the final rollcall 15 republic-
ans and three democrats voted
against the bill's passage, while 34
democrats and 19 republicans joined
in its support.

SUPREME ECONOMIC COUNCIL IS FORMED

Finance, Food and Other Quer-
tions to Be Considered
By New Body.

Paris.—Establishment of a supreme
economic council at Paris to deal with
questions of finance, food, blockade
control, shipping and raw materials
for the period of the armistice was
announced by the supreme war coun-
cil.

The economic council was approved
by the war council in the form of a
resolution which was presented by
President Wilson. Under the terms of
the resolution the economic council
will replace all other existing civilian
bodies, and will consist of not more
than five representatives of each of
the interested governments.

Fervent haste is marking the pro-
ceedings of the peace delegates in the
few days remaining before the return
of President Wilson to the United
States. The most difficult problems
relate to the new boundaries to be
created. The main efforts of the con-
ference leaders are directed toward
consolidation of their own forces and
in gaining adherence to the fundamen-
tal principles which are to govern the
future relations of states before de-
legates from the central powers are ad-
mitted to the conference.

A great deal has been done to settle
the various territorial disputes by
mediation and in endeavoring to have
such disputes submitted to the society
of nations when it is organized. A
notable success in this direction has
been in the conflict between Italy and
Jugo-Slavia over territory in the eastern
Adriatic.

As these difficulties are overcome,
however, others appear in the shape of
demands by some elements for the im-
position of harsher terms on Germany
than are contained in the present ar-
mistice agreement, not only for the
present, but also for the distant future.

FIFTY-FOUR I. W. W. TO BE DEPORTED

Chicago.—Fifty-four members of the
Industrial Workers of the World passed
through Chicago Sunday night in a
special train under a heavy guard
on the way to an Atlantic port, where
it is said they will be deported at
once by the immigration authorities.

Forty of the prisoners came direct
from Seattle, where they took part in
fomenting the general strike.

Three leaders of the Seattle strike,
one of the Spokane agitators, an I. W.
W. leader from Denver, and five alien
convicts arrested in Chicago, were
among the prisoners.

The majority of the men were alien
labor agitators picked up by officers
of the United States immigration ser-
vice during a year of secret campaign-
ing in industrial centers of the Pacific
Coast. A. D. Jackson, chief of the
Seattle office of the immigration ser-
vice, was in charge of the party.

The majority of the prisoners will
be sent back to Russian provinces.
They are principally Norwegians,
Swedes and Finns, according to the
guards on the train.

WOULD GIVE WILSON POWER

Measure Introduced Would Make Pres-
ident Controller of Wheat Prices.

Washington.—The carrying into ef-
fect of the government's \$2.26 wheat
guarantee by means of broad power
upon President Wilson was provided
in a bill introduced by Chairman Lever
of the house agricultural committee.

The bill would practically make
President Wilson the controller of
wheat prices and distribution through-
out the world. It grants the powers
asked by the food administration and
the federal grain corporation in bills
submitted to Lever and Senator Gore,
chairman of the senate agricultural
committee, but confines exercise of
the powers to wheat and flour, instead
of to all foodstuffs.

Syndicalism Act Enforced in Portland.

Portland, Ore.—Enforcement of the
criminal syndicalism act recently
passed by the Oregon legislature be-
gan in Portland with the arrest of
five persons charged with distributing
radical literature. Among those un-
der arrest is Harlin Talbert, secretary
of the state socialist party.

Inquiry is Directed at British Embargo

Washington.—Following receipt of
many protests from American busi-
ness men, the state department has
begun an inquiry into the embargo
placed on many American products by
the British government.

Gas Explosion Kills 8 in Wisconsin.

Platteville, Wis.—Eight known dead,
three missing, 17 injured, is the toll
taken by the explosion of the gas
plant in the Forehand block.
