

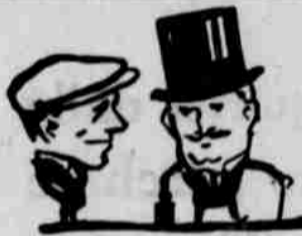

**Price Limit Suggested To President.**

Washington.—President Wilson has been asked to name a committee of industrial leaders and government representatives which will have the power to investigate and suggest a scale of prices for basic commodities at which the government will buy during the post-war period, Secretary of Commerce Redfield announced.

Washington.—Woman suffrage by federal constitutional amendment was beaten again in the senate, when the house resolution for submission of the amendment failed of adoption with 55 votes in favor of it and 29 against, one less than the necessary two-thirds.

## GERMAN FOREIGN MINISTER DEFIANT

Basel, Switzerland.—Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, German foreign secretary, discussing Germany's foreign policy in the national assembly, declared he had resisted and would continue to resist allied attempts to make Germany demobilize all her military forces. The task of the German nation might be summed up, he said, under to heads: First, ending of the state of war; second, establishment of normal relations with other peoples.  
"Unfortunately," he continued, "Germany's voluntary disarmament has not softened our enemies, who recently attempted to settle, on the basis of disarmament, questions undoubtedly appertaining to the peace conference."  
The foreign minister urged that no war indemnity should be paid and that no territory should be ceded to the victors. He continued:  
"If we rebuild what has been destroyed by us in territories we occupied, we will do so by our free labor. We protest against the slavery now being imposed on German prisoners of war."  
"Moreover," the foreign minister continued, "Germany cannot enter a league of nations without colonies."

## TROOP MOVEMENT FASTER

Practically All Troops in the United States Have Been Demobilized  
Washington.—Embarkation of soldiers from France is speeding up. At the same time demobilization of soldiers in American camps is about ended for the time being. Practically all that will be left in United States stations in a few days will be the "overhead," which must be maintained for some time to come.  
These facts developed from Chief of Staff March's press conference.  
1,103,310 men and 71,235 officers. The embarkation of overseas forces has reached 305,306, of whom 68,000 embarked in the first 10 days of February, and of whom 227,000 have actually reached American ports.

**Tacoman Named French Ambassador.**  
On Board the U. S. S. George Washington.—President Wilson has nominated Hugh C. Wallace of Tacoma, Wash., ambassador to France to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of William Graves Sharp.

**Allies Asked For Ships For Hoover.**  
Washington.—The shipping board will ask that England and France provide vessels to meet future requirements of the European relief commission headed by Herbert C. Hoover, Chairman Hurley announced.
