WHY THE VICTORY LOAN?

Although the armistice was signed November 11 the peak load of expenditures of the United States Government was carried after that date. Expenditures for the six months to the end of February were the heaviest of all periods. This statement leads strongly to the conviction that the Victory loan bonds is the real need of the Government for funds. In order to pay the accumulating costs the Treasury Department has been obliged to issue certificates of indebtedness in the amount of \$300,000,000 a week. These short time notes are almost due and must be taken up with the funds realized from the sale of Victory Bonds.

Green leafy plants are brushes and brooms that help keep the digestive tract clear and sweep the body clean of impurities that breed disease, says M. Winona Cruise, instructor in household science at the Oregon Agricultural College. They give the body a regular "housecleaning" every time they are eaten, which it sadly needs after a winter's diet lacking in greens. Early greens are eagerly gathered in spring or bought in the market. "For all the family needs greens." Mineral elements in greens neutralize the blood and aid muscular action, absorption of digested food and elimination of waste products. They give bulk or ballast against which the muscles exercise. Their chief value is the so-called vitamins, which is essential to growth and health. Leafy plants are protective foods, preventing disease in undernourished children who subsist mostly on seeds, tubers, and seed products. The lettuce leaf is entitled to new respect, for its worth is very great.—O. A. C. Dept. of Industrial Journalism.

SIMONDS SAYS AMERICA MUST END RED RULE

Frank H. Simonds, the noted war correspondent, in one of his comprehensive peace conference stories from Paris, says:

"All Europe recognizes the fact that the war is not yet over; that it will not be over until its consequences have been liquidated in a sure peace. "All allied Europe equally recognizes that only with America's continued aid can a safe peace be obtained and preserved. Accordingly, America's aid being priceless, no price is too great to pay.

"The one essential thing is that America should stay to finish the job. If she doesn't we may have anarchy and Bolshevism from Kamchatka to Land's End."
