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## COOPERATION WORTH WHILE

The people of the western part of the state want a highway from north to south through that tier of counties along the coast. They secured the passage of a bill during the legislature which provides for this road, and it is called the Roosevelt Highway.

The importance of the road to the state and all its people, as well as to the nation as a line of defense, can be clearly seen, and every voter in Oregon should support the measure, which will be on the ballot for ratification at the special election next month.

We, in Central Oregon, wish to support our irrigation districts by the endorsement of the bond interest while an irrigation district is young and have a measure on the ballot for that purpose. The cooperation of voters on the coast is promised us in return for the support of the Roosevelt Highway.

Plan now to vote at the special election and support both of these measures.

## GOOD MEASURES

There are several good measures on the ballot for the coming special election, especially of interest to the people of this part of the state.

One is the provision for farmers' roads, which provides for the levying of a nominal tax throughout the state for a fund which will be used on roads that are not main highways, for the accommodation of farmers in the more remote districts.

Another is the increase of limitation on the amount of bonds that may be voted for road purposes.

These measures are of vital importance to Central Oregon and they should receive the support of every voter in this county.

## EASTERN AND WESTERN OREGON JOIN HANDS

There are two measures on the ballot for June 3, which are linking together the extremes of Oregon. The proposed Roosevelt Memorial Highway, running from the California line to the Columbia river, within sight and sound of the spray and roar of the Pacific ocean, for its entire distance and opening up one of the most secluded districts in the state of Oregon, has been the means, not only of calling the attention of the extreme eastern end of the state to the close relationship that exists between the two extremes, but it has given the people of eastern Oregon an opportunity to show their open handed and warm appreciation of the spirit, initiative and friendship of the coast counties.

The farmers along the proposed Roosevelt Highway have learned to utilize their perpetually green pastures for the grazing of their herds and they buy practically all of their hay for winter use in Eastern Oregon. Thus, there is a strong business connection between the two sections and the supporters of the Roosevelt Highway have generously and freely been working to secure votes in their section of the country for the measure which authorizes the State to guarantee interest for five years on bonds of drainage and irrigation districts, because they believe the people of Eastern Oregon are going to appreciate their good work and their need for a Highway and reciprocate by voting for the Roosevelt Highway.

## ALLIES DECIDE TO TRY THE KAISER

Holland to Be Called Upon to Surrender Former German Emperor.

Washington.—New articles proposed for insertion in the peace treaty to be considered at the plenary session of the peace conference, the state department announced, include the following:

"Article I.—The allied and associated powers publicly arraign William II of Hohenzollern, formerly German emperor, not for an offense against criminal law, but for a supreme offense against international morality and the sanctity of treaties."

It is proposed that a special tribunal be constituted to try the accused consisting of five judges, one appointed by each of these five great powers: The United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. The allied and associated powers will request Holland to surrender the former emperor for trial.

Persons accused of violation of the laws and customs of war, according to a second article, will be brought before military tribunals, and if found guilty, "sentenced to the punishments laid down by military law."

All persons accused of having committed an act in violation of the laws and customs of war, who are specified "either by name or by the rank, office or employment which they held under the German authorities," will be demanded of the German government for trial by the military tribunal of the power against whose nationals the criminal acts were perpetrated.

## HIGH WHEAT PRICES ARE NOW PREDICTED

New York.—Officers of the food administration grain corporation announced their conviction, at the close of a three-day conference to determine policies for the coming year, that the government price guarantee to wheat growers could be made effective without endangering the market or causing loss to the national treasury.

Julius H. Barnes, president of the corporation and federal wheat director, declared that crop indications were that wheat would be traded in on the government fair price basis. It will be possible, he added, that the market generally might be above the fixed price schedule, in which event the wheat director would not be an influence in trading as congress adopted no maximum trade policy.

In case a crop exceeding a demand required government purchases and resales in order to make good the difference between the market price and the farmers' guarantee, Mr. Barnes said the conference recognized the necessity of measures to insure reflection of the resale rate to consumers of bread.

## Burleson Cannot Increase Rates.

Chicago.—Federal Judge Landis has ruled that Postmaster-General Burleson could not increase intrastate telegraph rates. He said he would dissolve the temporary injunction restraining the attorney-general of Illinois from interfering with the imposition of the higher rates. Judge Landis said that in his opinion, it was the intention of congress merely to give the president power to operate the wires as a national unit, but not to delegate to him the rate-making power.

## Will Allocate German Tonnage.

Washington.—The allied maritime transport council at Paris has determined to allocate enemy shipping among the associated governments, "according to the ability of the respective governments to bring the vessels into speedy use, and, in the case of passenger tonnage, according to respective needs."

## Wilson Tribute Revoked by Genoa.

Rome.—A demonstration at Genoa in protest against President Wilson's attitude culminated in the changing of the name of the street that had been named after the American president to Flume street.

## Army Recruits to Go Abroad.

Washington.—The first contingent of 1000 recruits enlisted by the war department for foreign service to relieve men in the army of occupation will leave Camp Meade April 20 for New York, preparatory to embarking.

Governor of Coast Reserve Bank Dies San Francisco.—James K. Lynch, governor of the Twelfth Federal Reserve bank, headquarters of which are in this city, dropped dead here Monday morning.

British Trade Blacklists Abolished. London.—The foreign office has announced the abolition of all trade blacklists from April 29.

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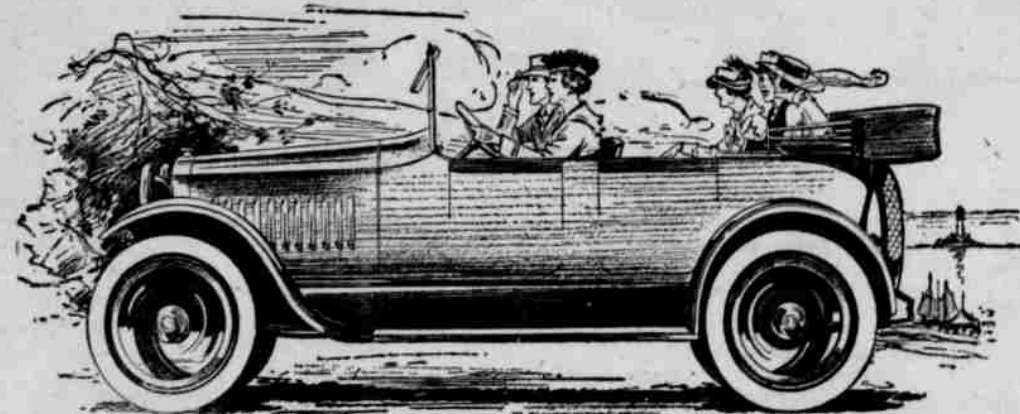
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
