### FARMERS PASS SOME RESOLUTIONS

The following is the resolution as passed by the Deschutes County Farm Bureau:

WHEREAS: There has come to our attention through the various newspapers that a deal is pending in the Powell Butte section for the purchase of a large tract of land, comprising about 13,900 acres of land and that Japanese interests are associated in the purchase of this land, and

WHEREAS: It is understood that American interests, particularly in Deschutes county are interested in the purchase of this tract, and are encouraging the consummation of this transaction, and

WHEREAS: It is universally recognized on the Pacific Coast that the acquisition of land by Japanese and the subsequent introduction of Japanese tenants and labor is detrimental to the best interests of the American farmer and business man, and

WHEREAS: It is the duty of every American to crystallize the re-born spirit of Americanism, that is, America for Americans, and

WHEREAS: It is also known that the assimilation of Japanese with Americans is utterly impossible and an intermingling of the two races impractical, and

WHEREAS: The consummation of the above named transaction will prove to be the greatest detriment to

the American citizens of Central Oregon, causing inevitable conflict of interests, making the rural communities less desirable places in which to live, and consequently tending to the extermination of American life—a condition to which the true American will ever desire to be a party.

RESOLVED: Therefore, we, the members of the executive committee of the Deschutes County Farm Bureau, protest against the consummation or completion of the above named transaction, and that all other persons who may now be interested in the consummation of this transaction not only withdraw immediately from direct to indirect connection with it, but do all in their power to discourage the completion of this deal, and all other deals in which Japanese individuals or corporations may have an interest; Be it further

RESOLVED: That all American citizens who up to this time may be interested in the completion of this land transaction take it upon themselves to investigate the results that may obtain with the settlement in Central Oregon of several thousand Japanese tenants not only with the present generation, but also with future generations, and be it further

RESOLVED: That copies of this resolution be read and acted upon by all the commercial bodies in Deschutes and Crook counties, and that the widest publicity be given to it in newspapers and other periodicals and that action favorable to this resolution be taken at the earliest possible date.
