V. R. M. Moore, advance man for Famous Players-Lasky Corporation who handle Paramount-Artcraft pictures was in town yesterday, looking over this territory.

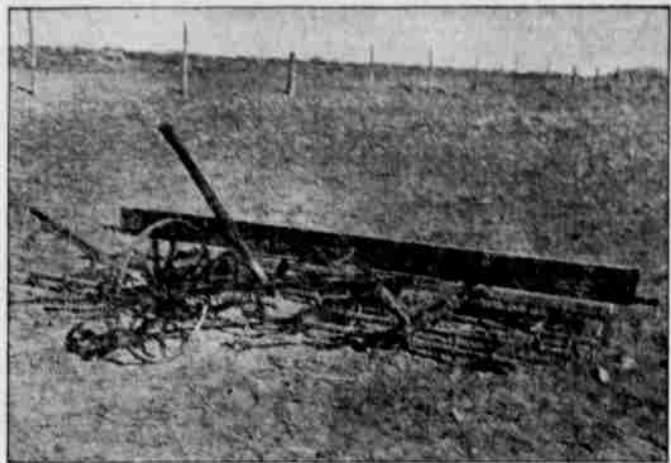
Mrs. Ada B. Millican is gaining considerable recognition for her work along literary lines at the University of Oregon. She is spending the winter at Eugene.

The picture shown above is an alfalfa and grass seeder. This machine is being manufactured by Charles C. O'Neil, who is a local man and very well known in Crook county.

As you will notice, this machine is attached to a harrow and it is an inexpensive piece of machinery, because it will wear for years. It will prove very useful to any farmer who owns an alfalfa or grass ranch, in that you are saving one operation by using this machine.

The machine consists of a long hopper which fastens to a harrow and is operated by a rod attached to a wheel

which travels directly behind the harrow.

This seeder is new in this part of the country, although it has been operated in the east for a good many years and no doubt will be of great benefit to the farmers of Crook county.

If you wish to see this machine go to the Lakin Hardware as he has one for demonstration. Mr. O'Neil has only a few of these machines on hand now, so if you wish one you had better see him or leave word at the Crook County Bank, because the few he has are not going to last long.
