TRAGIC ACCIDENT CAUSES DEATH OF D. KOOPMAN

D. Koopman of Post died at the ranch home yesterday morning after an illness of less than eighteen hours, surrounded by most tragic circumstances.

Mr. Koopman, who was a large owner of land and livestock, left home after noon on Tuesday going to The R. Booten ranch where he was working with some cattle.

When he failed to return at dark Joe Post and members of the family started a search and found his saddle horse tied to a fence at the Booten ranch, and parts of his clothing hanging on the fence.

They also discovered his tracks toward the Koopman ranch, the tracks indicating that he was injured in some way.

Search was continued until eleven o'clock at night when he was found three hundred yards from the Booten home.

He seemed to have suffered an apoplectic stroke, and in his effort to reach home had walked and crawled on the ground, and all his clothing excepting shirts had been lost from his body, the shirts being about his shoulders and the body exposed to the winds and snow which alone would have caused death.

He was given every possible care but expired at 6:15 yesterday morning.

The body was brought to Prineville yesterday, and funeral services will be held tomorrow, but whether at Prineville or Post has not yet been decided.

Mr. Koopman was 56 years of age, was born in Germany, but had been a citizen of this country for many years, and had a large circle of friends here.

COUNTY HIGHWAY PROGRAM DEPENDS ON ELECTION
