This very appropriate gift was presented by Mrs. Nevel through a letter to the Post, read by Dr. Rosenberg. This token of appreciation so presented will be a valued possession of Crook County Post, and the Adjutant was ordered to extend the sincere thanks of the post to the donors for the same.

The check from the United Artisans, Prineville Association No. 163, was received at this meeting. This check is for \$173.00, proceeds of the dance recently given by the Artisans in order to assist the Legion in raising money for the Community Hall Building Fund. With such co-operation as this, it will not be long before this building can be erected. The Adjutant was ordered to extend the Legion's thanks for this check.

A letter from Department Commander, W. F. Follett, to the Crook County Post, was read at this time, asking support and endorsement of the Higher Educational Tax Act, was read and discussed.

Upon motion, it was unanimously resolved, and L. M. Bechtel was authorized to draw up a resolution showing that Crook County Post is highly in favor of this act, and is backing and supporting it.

Thirty dollars worth of War Savings stamps, which the Commercial Club had accumulated, were presented to the Post to be used in its work, by the above organization. Thanks were extended for this assistance.

Adopted by Crook County Post, No. 29, the American Legion, Department of Oregon.

WHEREAS, The members of the American Legion in Crook County have only recently returned to their civilian occupations after participating in the Great World War with Germany, and

WHEREAS, The Great War was the result of Germany's desire for self aggrandizement, world power, and increased colonial territory for her teeming millions, and

WHEREAS, Germany's strength in the first year of the war was gained by the spread of invidious propaganda and locating spies in every foreign country, and

WHEREAS, Japan's desire for additional territory is produced by economic conditions similar to those existing in Germany prior to the World War, and her constant aim to increase the number of her local colonies in the United States is deemed no less pernicious than the German brand, and

WHEREAS, The Japanese citizens are excluded from becoming American citizens and owning land in the United States because of their difference in race, psychology, habits of living and general undependability, and

WIDOW LOSES HOME ON HIGH DESERT

Fire Takes Home And Belongings Of Little Family

DISCOVERED IN SERIOUS PLIGHT

Rescues And Takes Stricken Family To Shelter

Far out in the High Desert, surrounded by desolate miles of dry, sandy sagebrush country, where only an occasional traveler passes in a car, never lingering along the road, but covering the miles as swiftly as a car will go, in order to spend as lit-

tle time in that lonely, forsaken country as possible, a widow stood last Thursday during the awful and storm, and with her two little children clinging to her dress, watched their lonely home burn to the ground.

This land was a homestead, earned by many months of work and loneliness where perhaps others might think that the results would not be worth the effort, but on account of the water obtainable on this land, it has some value as a feeding place for stock, which otherwise might not be raised in that country.

This homestead is located about six miles east of Millican, where there was formerly a store, but the storekeeper long since went bankrupt, and the creditors seized his stock of goods and there is only vacant buildings to give the location a name.

Mrs. Rosen's husband had left her some time in the past, but still she lingered on, loathe perhaps to leave the one spot that had become dear to her as the place she called home, where memories both bitter and

sweet, clustered around the touches of civilization that had been given to this little spot. Mrs. Rosen remained kneeling out her living by attending to some stock which had been left in her care by some stockman.

It was while looking after the needs of this stock, and seeing that all she could do for their comfort in the storm had been done, that she looked toward her 4 room house and discovered that it was on fire. She rushed toward the house, but before she could get any of her possessions out, the whole house was in flames. Her two children, about eight and ten years of age, ran to her, and she thankfully clasped them in her arms, glad that they had not been burned in the house, and they stood at a safe distance, and watched all they had, except the clothes on their backs, go up in flames and smoke, and wondered what they were to do. They were so far from other habitations, that no neighbor lived near enough to see the blaze, or could know that they needed assistance in their plight.

While the gloom was thickest, and the embers of their home still glowed hot, a car drove up and stopped by their side, and E. T. Clark, asked them in tones of sympathy, if there was anything he could do for them, and they told him the story.

Mr. Clark was driving from his ranch at Held to Prineville, and in order to escape the nerve-racking strain of trying to get his car through the bad stretches of the Canyon Road he had chosen to come the much longer way around, over the High Desert road, where the distance is much longer, but less chance of a breakdown.

Mr. Clark has a heart as big as his smile, which is well known to all his many friends, and his heart went out to the pathetic little family, and he offered his assistance at once. Upon talking with the mother, he learned that they were friends in Bend who would assist them if they could be reached, and so, though it was far out of his way, and he is a busy man, he assisted Mrs. Rosen and the children into the car and delivered them into the hands of friends at Bend. Mrs. Rosen gratefully thanked him, and will always remember him as one who came to her assistance when all seemed dark, and she and her children were without shelter in the High Desert.

There are not many men who would go so far out of their way just to help those in distress, as Mr. Clark did on this occasion. Most travelers would have brought them on into Prineville, and let them wait here for their friends. Little deeds like this show the true worth of a man in his community, and the reward is great, though it only be the memory of a kind deed cheerfully done.

"If you have thought of your tires merely as things underwheel, try taking a little care of them, and you will be agreeably surprised at the increased mileage that you receive, and it will be noticeable from a momentary standpoint as well."

"Friend wife will begin to ask why are the tires lasting so well this time, and you can rear back proudly and declare that "care pays", in tires as well as children."
