**Proper Food for Parrot**

Parrots in the wild state live on seed and fruit, and should, while in captivity, be fed as nearly as possible the same kind of food. They should be fed sunflower seed, hemp seed, hulled yellow corn, stale bread soaked in water, an occasional piece of apple or banana, roasted peanuts, dry crackers. Plenty of water and gravel should be kept in the cage. The parrot's cage should be cleaned every day.
