The United States Civil Service Commission announced an examina-tion to be held at Prineville, Oregon, on May 8, 1929 as a result of which it is expected to make a certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth-class postmaster at Roberts, Oregon, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement.
