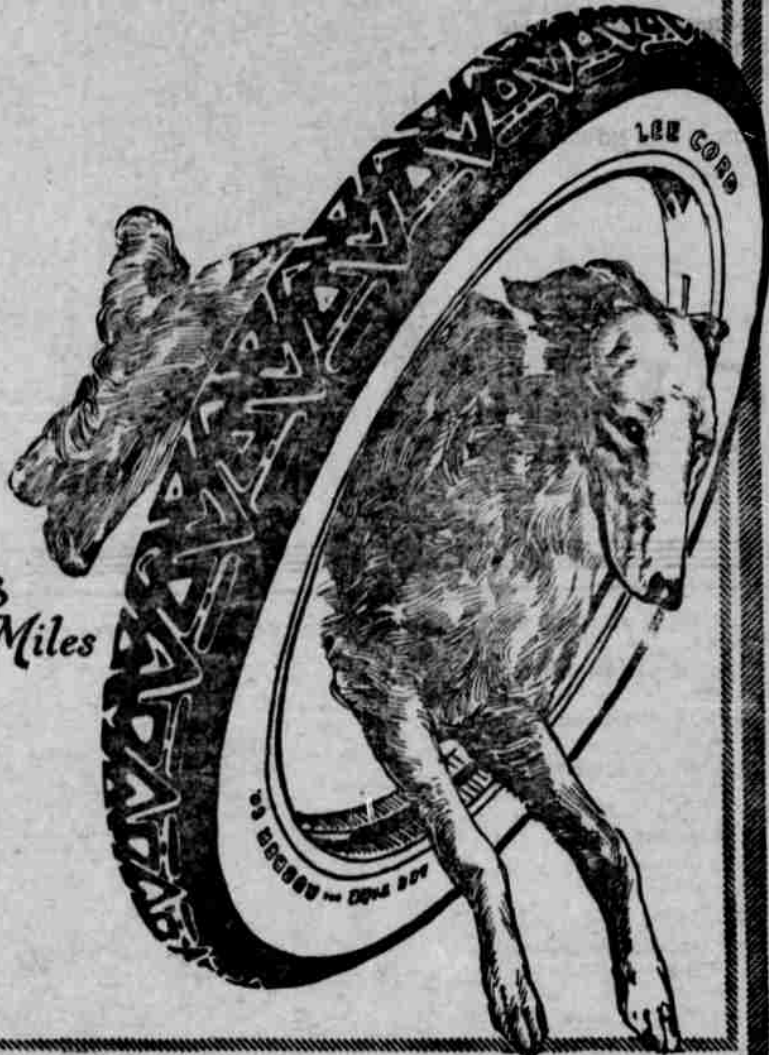

EIGHT MURDERED ON NORTH DAKOTA FARM

Turtle Lake, N. D.—Eight persons were found dead at the farm home of Jacob Wolf, three miles north of here, victims in a mysterious tragedy.

Seven of the eight persons found slain were shot and the eighth was struck a fatal blow on the side of the head with a hatchet. It was decided at the coroner's inquest. Jacob Wolf, on whose farm the tragedy occurred, his wife and four daughters were victims of shotgun wounds. Martha Wolf, three years old, had been struck on the head with a hatchet. Jake Hofer, 12, hired boy, also was shot to death. Some of the victims also had been struck with the hatchet.

Powder marks and burns indicated most of the shots had been fired at close range.

Emma, eight months old, the only member of the Wolf family to escape death, is being cared for by neighbors. When found she was lying in a cradle beside an open window.

BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

Chicago packers have completed sale of \$46,000,000 of provisions to the German government.

The bill designed to relieve the print paper shortage by making print paper under 8 cents free of duty for two years was signed by President Wilson.

W. J. Bryan will control the Nebraska delegation to the democratic national convention. The figures give Bryan ten delegates and Hitchcock six.

In the face of government investigations, sugar refining interests have advanced their quotation to a new record of \$20.50 per hundred pounds at refinery points.

Value of meat and dairy products exported in March declined greatly as compared with March of a year ago, the total being estimated at \$70,000,000, compared with \$122,000,000.

The American public will spend \$15,000,000,000 this year for unnecessary luxuries, David B. Houston, secretary of the treasury, estimated in condemning "riotous, extravagant conditions."

Alarming conditions indicating a world shortage of wheat and forecasting famine conditions unless a greater acreage of spring wheat is planted in the United States are pictured in a statement issued by the department of agriculture.

Portland Shipyards Investigated. Portland, Or.—The United States grand jury will examine the evidence regarding shipbuilding deals secured by special agents of the department of justice, who have been in the city for the last three weeks, which may result in the return of indictments against Emergency Fleet corporation officials and yard operators of a nature similar to those now pending in Seattle.

Wilson Nominates Land Registers. Washington.—Nominations of registers of land offices sent to the senate by President Wilson included: William H. Canon, at Roseburg, Or.; George A. C. Rochester, at Seattle, Wash.; John L. Wiley, at Spokane, Wash., and Richard Strobach, at Yakima, Wash. The president also nominated Sydney S. Baggs to be receiver of public moneys at Waterville, Wash.

Railroads Cannot Own Coal Stock. Washington.—The federal government won its anti-trust suit against the Reading company and affiliated coal companies in one of the so-called anthracite coal cases. The Reading and Central of New Jersey railroads the court decided, must dispose of ownership of coal company stocks.

Mexican Generals Barred From Texas. Austin, Texas.—Request of the Mexican government through the state department at Washington for permission for Generals Juan Jose Rios and Manuel Gambo and their staffs to cross Texas soil on their way from Sonora to Mexico City was refused by Governor Hobbie of Texas.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the Legislative Assembly.
LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the creation of debts and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent now provided by law.

NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX
NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES
NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX

Keep these three facts in mind. The present auto license fees and gasoline tax will pay both the principal and interest on all the bonds under this amendment, and will yield an annual surplus besides for other state highway work. No additional taxation of any kind.

FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE MATCHED

Oregon must have sufficient Highway Funds to match Federal apportionments or Oregon cannot get the benefit of Federal money for Oregon Roads. Increasing this constitutional limit is a necessity. Unless limit is increased, either state roads cannot be completed for many, many years, or must be finished by direct property taxation. This measure averts direct property tax for state highways and makes early completion possible. Let's get the roads built now.

Income from Present Sources Sufficient to Pay Principal and Interest.

The fact that revenue from auto license fees and gasoline tax, without increase of present rates, will be ample to pay both principal and interest on these bonds, is clearly set forth by official figures in the State Pamphlet, mailed to every registered voter. It shows that no property tax is required and that present rates for auto license fees and gas tax will reduce principal and interest and yield a surplus in aid.

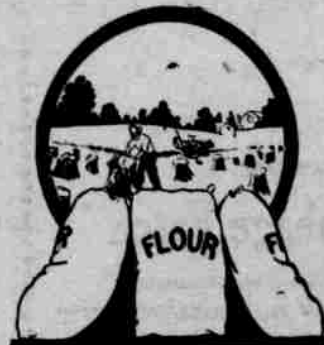
