The present cost at the State University is \$203 a year; at the College it is \$150. But even before the war, when money would buy twice as much as it buys now, the average cost at all other state institutions was \$325 a year. In addition.

At the State University it is at present \$322 per student; at the College, \$300. But in state institutions elsewhere, statistics show the average to be \$995. These are convincing proofs of economical administration, but the three institutions can no longer give satisfactory training to the vast number of Oregon Boys and Girls (5,400 in full time courses alone.) unless they receive more support. On May 21 the Higher Educational relief measure will appear on the ballot. You are urged to preserve the quality of higher education by voting for it.

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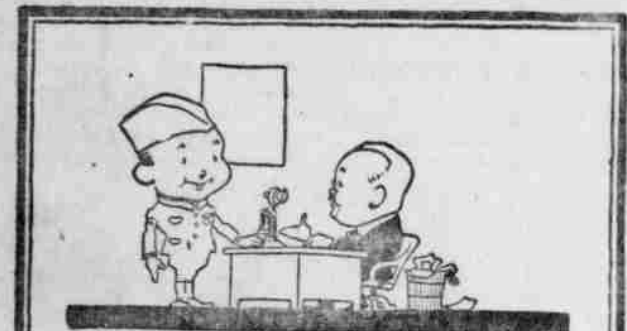

**RAILROAD CENTERS AFFECTED BY STRIKE**

Chicago.—Many railroad centers were affected by the insurgent strike of switchmen and passenger service was affected in some places, notably New York city.

Reports of the number of strikers were confused by the variance between the figures of union officers and strikers. Unofficial figures from the various railroad centers affected showed about 40,000 men on strike.

In addition thousands of persons were indirectly affected by the strike through the closing of steel mills, packing plants and other industries dependent on the roads for coal and raw material.

**TACOMA BOYCOTTS 'SPUDS'**

Restaurants Urge People To Eat Rice and Beans.

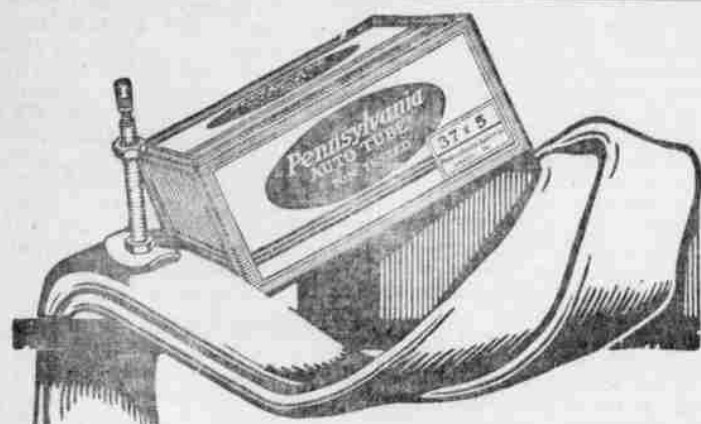
Tacoma, Wash.—A boycott on the use of potatoes was started here. They are selling for \$165 a ton, and dealers predict they will touch the \$200 mark.

Local restaurants displayed such signs as "potatoes are outrageously high. Eat beans, rice and macaroni." "Boycott potatoes for 20 days and watch the price drop."

Produce dealers said that housewives are refusing in many cases to buy potatoes, but that they are selling all they can obtain.

**North-South Idaho Railroad Proposed.**

Boise, Ida.—The public utilities commission has forwarded to the interstate commerce commission a complaint asking that the three railroads interested in the Camas Prairie line between Lewiston and Grangeville be ordered to make a 97 mile extension from Penn, Idaho, to New Meadows, to connect with the P. & I. N., thus giving this state a north and south railroad. This has been the dream of Idaho citizens for 25 years and the commission's action was the first concrete move in that direction.



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
