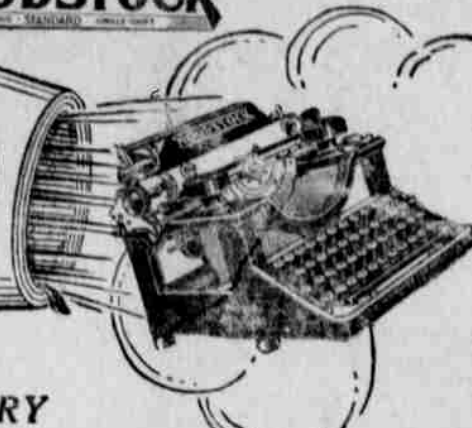
His Illustrations Immortal.

Summer School Information
EXTENSION OF THE OREGON NORMAL SUMMER SCHOOL TO BE HELD IN PENDLETON FOR SIX WEEKS, BEGINNING JUNE 21, 1926

Arrangements have been made whereby an extension of the Oregon Normal School will be held at Pendleton for six weeks, beginning June 21, 1926. The Faculty will be composed of members of the regular Oregon Normal School Faculty and other excellent instructors.

Special methods in the different subjects for all the grades from one to eight inclusive will be given as well as methods for rural schools.

Those wishing to take the course may take the six weeks at Pendleton and then six weeks at Monmouth, beginning August 2, 1926, or the elementary teachers' training twelve weeks may be taken at Monmouth.

The same credits will be given for work taken as is given in the Summer School at Monmouth.
