OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Oregon stands eighth in the list in regard to paid-up membership in the American Legion.

Dr. O. D. Duane's 20-acre cherry orchard near The Dalles this year netted him a profit of \$12,000.

More than 2000 retail buyers are expected in Portland during annual buyers' week, August 9 to 14.

Sheriff Johnson of Hood River county has asked for volunteers to assist him in enforcing speed laws.

Indications are that the commercial apple crop of the state as a whole will be about 60 per cent of last year.

Oregon wheat exported during the year ended June 30, 1920, amounted to 2,875,882 bushels and flour 3,201,115 barrels.

Because it is no longer a necessary organization in the state, Governor Oicott has dissolved the state council of defense.

William Porter, 59, instructor in forging at the Oregon Agricultural college, died Thursday at his home in Corvallis.

The Lane county court has decided not to build a new bridge across the Willamette at Harrisburg for at least two years.

An underground crossing will be built where the Pacific highway crosses the railroad two miles north of Albany.

The Portland Railway, Light and Power company has paid to Clackamas county \$94,000, the first half of its county taxes.

The recently organized Southwestern Oregon Livestock association is planning to hold an annual exposition at Marshfield.

Members of the Oregon State Dental association opened the first session of their 27th annual convention Monday morning in Portland.

Lightning struck and seriously damaged the steeple of the First Presbyterian church in Portland during a heavy electric storm.

Approximately 125,000 applications for motor vehicle drivers' licenses have been received at the offices of the secretary of state.

At the present rate of growth of bank clearings in Portland it is estimated that this year's total will reach the \$2,000,000,000 mark.

Three hundred dollars was appropriated by the city council of Albany to assist in the establishment of a municipal swimming pool.

Harry Shown of Twickenham in Wheeler county was seriously burned while trying to start a crude oil burning engine used in irrigation.

Reverend W. M. Case of Eugene has been elected moderator of the Oregon synod of the Presbyterian church to succeed L. M. Boozer of Medford.

One hundred aliens were deported from Oregon in the fiscal year ending June 30, according to the annual report of the bureau of immigration.

Hereafter marriage will not be a bar to election to position as teacher in the Portland public schools, according to policy established by the school board.

The state board of control now has in transit to the Robert Andrews company of New York a carload of flax fiber and tow for which the state receives \$11,621.50.

The boys' and girls' industrial clubs of Shedd, among which is included the largest boys' Jersey calf club in the world, will hold their annual industrial fair on September 10.

On the ground that the city of Woodburn has exceeded its limit of indebtedness, A. C. Simmons has brought suit to restrain the city from undertaking certain improvements.

The city of Roseburg has received legal advice that bonds recently authorized by a special election for the sum of \$7000 for an aviation field outside the city limits are invalid.

Salem Cherrians have accepted the proposal of A. H. Lea, secretary of the state fair board, that the Cherrians make Tuesday, September 28, of state fair week, a special booster day.

Exports from the Portland district during the year ended June 30, 1920, were valued at \$40,388,320, while the exports from the Astoria district for the same period were valued at approximately \$7,000,000.

With the harvest of one of the largest cherry crops in the history of the state in full blast, the fruit, rain-split, is a drug on the market and hard to move at any price, according to reports coming from Willamette valley points.

Representing practically every line of business in Portland, a petition bearing the names of more than 300 men and women urging Mayor George L. Baker to announce himself a candidate for re-election, was presented to the mayor.

Linn county is facing a serious shortage of teachers, according to Mrs. Ida Cummings, county school superintendent, who says that of the 275 teachers needed, only five have thus far returned signed contracts.

Professor C. K. Hale, former Portland and native Oregonian, has been selected by University of Oregon executives to act as the new dean of the law school, taking the place of Dean E. H. Hope, who has resigned.

Funds appropriated for the administration of the provisions of the soldiers' educational aid act are available only to ex-service men desiring to attend an Oregon school, according to an opinion of Attorney General Brown.

Undivided opposition to any move toward the sanctioning of professional boxing in Albany by the municipal authorities has been presented by the churches of the city, in which a canvass of the congregations was made.

Recent action by the Port of Astoria authorities in reducing rates for handling and storing grain in the grain elevators of that port to one-half the rates in Portland and Seattle, may result in a rate-cutting war between the three cities.

The county court sold the old Wasco county courthouse at The Dalles to Friendship lodge, No. 9, Knights of Pythias, for \$12,750. The lodge will remodel it—one of the oldest buildings in the city—into a beautiful lodgeroom and Pythian home.

In order to guard against the possible invasion of Columbia river ports by the bubonic plague, which has become a serious menace at several ports in the United States, strict regulations of shipping were put into force both in Astoria and Portland.

Pendleton, Hermiston and Stanfield will co-operate in entertaining and showing the 20 members of the house of representatives ways and means committee irrigation and drainage projects and the needs of Umatilla county on their visit July 16.

The office of county superintendent of schools, of Clackamas county, made vacant by the resignation of J. E. Callavan, was filled by the county court, with the appointment of Brenton Vedder, who for the past six years has been county school supervisor.

Because it offered to give par and interest accrued at the time of delivery, the First Savings bank of Albany was awarded the contract to buy \$75,000 worth of the \$600,000 permanent Linn county road bonds authorized by the people in June, 1919.

Fire losses in Oregon for the month of June, not including the city of Portland, totaled \$268,735, according to a report prepared by A. C. Barber, state fire marshal. The fires numbered thirty-two, the most disastrous occurring at Whitney, with a loss of \$65,000.

A. M. Cannon, formerly of the Portland schools, who has arrived in Hood River to assume his duties as superintendent of city schools, has announced that B. H. Conkle, who for the past few years has been principal of the Enterprise high school, has been appointed principal of the Hood River school.

Approximately 250,000 gallons of Texas gasoline will be brought into Oregon this week in an attempt to relieve the shortage existing in Portland and the Willamette valley, according to arrangements made by the Dealers' Motor Car Association of Oregon and the Southern Pacific Railway company.

Organization of the republican state central committee was effected Saturday in Portland with the re-election of Thomas H. Tongue of Hillsboro as chairman. Under the direction of the state committee, Chairman Tongue was authorized to appoint an executive committee of 21 members, 11 of whom shall be members of the state committee, and ten women. This executive committee will select a treasurer, secretary and publicity manager.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1920, a total of 21,378 industrial accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission, according to a statement just issued by the claim department of that commission. Of that number 157 were fatal accidents. The monthly average for the year was 1768.41 non-fatal accidents and 12.8 fatal accidents. The report shows that during the year the commission disposed of 1479 claims more than the total numbered received, this making an average monthly gain of 123.25 claims.

Persons under 16 years of age who attempt to drive a motor vehicle in Oregon, are doing so in violation of the provisions of the recently enacted motor vehicle drivers' license law and are subject to arrest and fine, according to a statement issued by Secretary of State Kozier. Although the enforcement of the law has been suspended temporarily, pending the issuance of licenses to those who have filled their applications, the law specifically prohibits the operation of motor vehicles by persons under 16 years of age, license or no license, and there is no excuse for the violation of this section of the act, Kozier explains.
