The firing squad at the Masonic cemetery, where the body was interred was composed of William Moore, Paul Gibson, Martin Hoover, Ivan Jones, Frank O'Kelley and Asa Battles, with R. E. Froiseth in charge. Taps were sounded by George Budge.

The grave was decorated with a beautiful wreath of flowers, a token of the respect in which Crook county Post No. 29 held their dead comrad.

Cyrus Kimmell and Everett Harpham are Crook county boys who were also on the ill-fated Tuscania, when it was hit by a German torpedo and sunk off the Scottish coast, and who were able to get to shore safely.
