SHALL THERE BE ISSUED BONDS OF CROOK COUNTY TO FUND WARRANTS DRAWN ON ITS TREASURER TO EVIDENCE DEBTS AND LIABILITIES IMPOSED ON IT BY LAW AND WHICH THE COUNTY IS POWERLESS TO PREVENT IN THE AMOUNT OF ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000), THE LENGTH OF TIME OF SAID BONDS SHALL RUN TO BE AS FOLLOWS:

- \$10,000 thereof for six (6) years from date of issue;
- \$10,000 thereof for seven (7) years from date of issue;

In view of the desperate situation of this county financially, the County Court earnestly urges the people to vote favorably on the above question. It does not mean that a single dollar of indebtedness will be created, but simply gives the county an opportunity to sell bonds to take care of warrants already outstanding. These warrants were inherited when the county was last divided, and under the law as it now stands there is not one single chance to pay them off except by an issue of bonds. If this manner is adopted, we will be able to make a small levy each year with which to pay interest and sinking fund and take up the bonds as indicated on the above ballot.

We urge the people to vote for this proposition and put the county on a cash basis.
