The sand storm of Friday night blew in a window of the L. P. G. hall, uncovered haystacks and roofs where there was paper roofing.

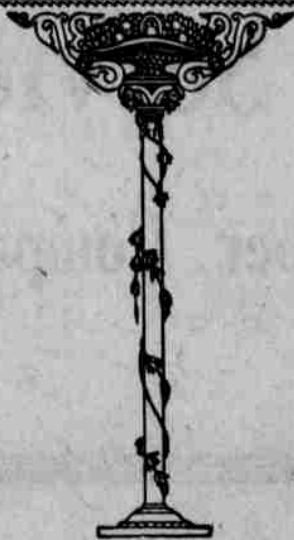
Mr. and Mrs. Omar Cyrus spent the week-end with their son Melvin Cyrus and wife, at the farm.
