CENTRAL OREGON COUNTIES

The following appended data rela-Oregon is compiled from the reports of Bureau of Crop Estimates of the Department of Agriculture in charge of F. L. Kent, of Portland.

The acreage is taken from the assessor's rolls in each county, and the yield is determined by personal invesigation, reports from growers. and other reliable sources. The value is taken from the average selling

The price per unit has been difficult to determine for many of the crops, owing to the continued decline since early harvest. For grain price as recorded by the Portland daily papers from September 1, to December 31, 1920, less freight expenses from the producing centers, has been the basis of valuation. In some counties where all of a crop produced is consumed locally, practically the full Portland price has been used.
